critic, that his personal relations with Mr. Cake were not altogether pleasant, but that he regarded the republican candidate for U. S. senator as clean and upright—a man of ability and splendid character, and he was cheered heartily when he said these things.

He criticised the "Recall" and said that the republican party was the only political organization that had taken a stand against it. "There is compromise in everything else but politics," said the speaker, "and there is need for it here. Minimise the points of difference and magnify the points on which you agree. There is need of loyalty to the church, the home and to party." He closed by urging the republicans to stand by party and sound the first gun for the election of William Taft president, and the rousing applause he got from the house was enough as to say "we will."

In a few well chosen words Dr. Wood, candidate for state senator of this county, presented his case; as also did John Bailey, candidate for county clerk. Both gentlemen thanked the

citizens of this place for their splendid support in the primaries and were well received.
