We rise to ask: Is Washington county for Statement No. One?

The recall got a majority in this state, but we wonder if the governor will be as ready to make a proclamation declaring it a law, as he undoubtedly will the Statement One amendment.

The feeble efforts made by The News in the interest of the regular republican nominees in this county are most gratifying to us, although we did no more than what seemed to be the duty of a newspaper for the principles of the party in which it believes. This paper took a stand that behooved all newspapers to take that believe in the good work of the party.

Old Washington County has done the right thing and the entire republican ticket is elected. Calk made a lead over Chamberlain of 133 votes and as Withycombe carried the county by only 37 it makes a vast difference over two years ago. The results, even with this gain, would indicate that the voters had Chamberlain instilled in them so deeply that they forgot all else. Invariably a Chamberlain ballot would switch to the regular republican legislature, which stands absolutely against the governor, while the Statement No. One ticket met its Waterloo. This is a situation that is ludicrous and shows that the principle was not considered, but the man. However, the "peoples choice" amendment carried; why shouldn't the Statement One ticket carry? And the echo is, why!
