said, wherever these institutions are. Mr. Walker made a hit with his audience by singing a Chinese ditty and an old college song, accompanying himself on the guitar.

Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian and the first graduate of the college, having completed the course in '63 was given a rousing ovation by the audience when he arose to speak. He said that there always had to be a beginning of things and fate had fallen on him to be the first graduate of Pacific University. "I first saw Forest Grove in 1853," he said, "my sister coming here from LaFayette. And in 1856 I entered school. At that time Dr. Marsh and Judge Shattuck were the only teachers and there were but three students, these remaining but a short time. In 1861, during my college course, I was made principal of the academy. The students lived in shacks and sheds. I lived in a little hut over yonder where the old college building now stands and my father lived two miles and a half out on the Gales Creek road. There were but six or seven families here then, no streets, and people burned brush for fuel. But now Forest Grove is an ideal place and the buildings of Pacific University, the main building and the ladies' dormitory are ideal. But we need a new men's dormitory and a new gymnasium, in olden days we did not need a gymnasium as we got our exercise by following the plow."

Editor Scott urged the young people to have a purpose. "All can not be professional men," he said. "The tendency of the times is to specialize, as it is impossible to do more than one or two things well. Simply to acquire facts isn't much; there must be contemplation."

Speeches were also made by Dr. David Rafferty of the class of '67 and Judge Edward B. Watson of '66, after which refreshments were served at the ladies' hall.

Misses Maud and Kate Shannon sang very beautifully, "Birds that Sing in May," and were called back. Miss Sarah Glance, recently of Australia but now of Portland, appeared in four vocal numbers besides an' encore. Miss Glance was most enthusiastically received in all of her numbers. 
