The county court met in regular monthly meeting Wednesday, July 1st, and transacted the following business: Petition for road of C. True et al. Ordered that petition be received and referred to prosecuting attorney.

Petition of Jane M. Smith, to vacate street. Ordered that avenue between blocks 1 and 2 in Bamford add in Forest Grove be vacated.

John McClaran's resignation as road supervisor of Dist. No. 16 accepted.

Appointment of James Churchill as supervisor of road district No. 16 approved and bonds of \$1000 fixed.

Report of Road Viewers on the Pete Zeurcher petition, read first time.

Ordered that petition of Tuality lodge A. F. and A. M. for adjustment of taxes be allowed as per petition.

Report of Viewers adopted in case Herman Schmidt for public easement.

Report of Viewers on Peter Zeurcher et al read second time.

In the matter of making an order of prohibition in South Hillsboro precinct. It is ordered that the sale of intoxicating liquors be and is hereby absolutely prohibited within the limits of South Hillsboro precinct, Washington county, Oregon.

In the matter of refundment of license money to Wm. Martin, it is ordered that the sum of \$177.80 be refunded on account of prohibition in Gaston precinct.

Report of viewers on road No. 448 having been read first time on July 2 and on coming up for final reading, it is ordered that said report be adopted and road established.

In the matter of the transfer of liquor license, it is ordered that the liquor business of C. E. Smith in East Cedar precinct be transferred to Brad W. Davis and that bond of said Davis be approved.

Coroner's report of the death of Thos. Waugh, it is ordered that report be approved and bills drawn for expense.

Coroner's report on death of Mrs. George Kronenbach, it is ordered that report be approved and bills be drawn for expense.

The application of the McMinnville Telephone Co., for franchise granted.

Report for June of E. J. Godman approved with fees \$138.25.

Report of G. W. McGraw for permission to erect scales allowed.

Application of J. W. Connell for refund of taxes allowed in the sum of \$4.17 for penalty and interest on J. W. Harris D. D. C.

Application for refundment of taxes of O. Johnson allowed in the sum of \$2.00

Application for refundment of taxes of J. N. Pliffin. Ordered that the amount of \$9 be refunded and that treasurer adjust tax in school district Nos. 24 and 98.

Application of S. P. R. R. Co. for refundment of tax, ordered that sum of \$18.31 be refunded.

It is ordered that affidavit of L. F. Carstens on cruise of timber on certain lands in township 2 N. R. 3 W. be accepted as proof and that warrants be ordered to issue to parties interested for amounts of over payment of taxes.

It is ordered that the bonds of the sheriff, clerk, school superintendent and treasurer be approved when the same has been passed on by the prosecuting attorney.
