It is announced that Senator Beveridge of Indiana, will make speeches in Oregon for Taft.

H. M. Cake, who was defeated by Gov. Chamberlain for U. S. senator, has returned from Japan and has offered to go on the stump for Taft. His services have been accepted.

There is a bad feature in the morning mail service that it would seem should be remedied. The mail from Portland at 8:39 is loaded on the street car and carried to within one block of the postoffice and is then carried back to the depot to await the arrival of the 8:50 from the south. Sometimes this train is late, but even if it was always on time, it makes the patrons of the postoffice wait from three quarters to an hour longer for their mail than is necessary. This can be remedied and the street car company should see that it is done.

"That might can be made to take the place of right is plainly seen in the case of the Minnesota primary laws. A more damnable measure was never enacted into law. Concocted by scheming republican politicians and supported by the republican party for self-perpetuating purposes." etc.

This comes from a Democratic paper in Minnesota, and the primary law there is practically the same as the Oregon law. What a different howl we hear in this state about the primary law! The Oregonian of Tuesday had the following to say of a Taft Club that was NOT organized here a few weeks ago: "W. A. Williams, of Forest Grove, called at Republican headquarters yesterday and reported that a Taft club would be organized in that city tonight, under the auspices of the Republican State Central Committee. The Bourne people

quietly organized such a club in Forest Grove a few weeks ago, but when the responsibility for its organization was discovered the club was dissolved and its delegates to the state convention of Taft clubs were withdrawn. The club to be formed tonight will be organized by many of the members of the original club but it will be affiliated with the Republican State organization, according to Mr. Williams." No republican of this city or vicinity ever attempted to organize a Bourne or Fulton Taft club neither were the delegates to the state convention withdrawn "when the identity of the organization was disclosed." The News does not believe that Mr. Williams ever gave the Oregonian any such rot.

The Colonist Rate leaflets issued in connection with the Sunset Magazine Homesekers' Bureau, and paid for by the citizens of Washington county, Forest Grove included, comes as near ignoring the largest town in the county and the one that put up the most money, of anything that has ever been sent here for distribution. The real estate men positively refuse to send them out and as a consequence the entire lot sent to Forest Grove has gone to waste. Just why Forest Grove is obliterated from the map, and you might say the entire leaflet, is one of the conundrums unsolved by the people of this place and until someone comes forth with more knowledge of the case than it has been our good fortune to find as yet, it will never be solved.

Gov. Chamberlain, U. S. Senator elect (?) has given his consent to go on the stump for Bryan and Kern. This is one of the most decided non-partisan acts the governor has as yet participated in and one that should be cherished by the republicans who so generously voted for him in the last June election. Chamberlain, you know, is absolutely non-partisan and should be helped by the republican voters to anything he wants, and when he visits our community again in the interests of the Bryan and Kern candidacy, why of course the same republicans should rally to the great non-partisan. This is a gentle dose and the Chamberlain republicans are justly entitled to it, for the governor will no doubt tell you that the office of the president is absolutely non-partisan and there is nothing else left to do but to believe what you hear.
