**Obituary.**

Mary Adelaide Storms was born in Ticonderoga, New York, August 8, 1850, and died in Portland Sanitarium September 16, 1908.

She moved with her parents to Whitewater, Wisconsin, when but three years old, where she grew to womanhood and was married to Stephen Morgan, December 10, 1868. To this union were born five children, L. L., of Portland; A. P. of Ragan, Nebraska; Ada P., who died in infancy; Dayse Markee, and Emma M. Morgan, of Forest Grove.

In February, 1869, they moved to Blackhawk county, Iowa, and in June, 1871, to Lincoln, Nebraska. Early in the winter of 1872, she was converted and was baptized in the First Baptist church of Lincoln. In October, 1872, they moved to Harlan county, Nebraska, on a homestead near Orleans, which was at that time on the frontier, among the buffalo and Indians, grasshoppers and drouth. She was an enthusiastic worker in building up the new country.

She united with the United Brethren church there and was instrumental in organizing three Sunday schools in that section. The United Brethren church disbanded, and in 1887 she united with the First Methodist Episcopal church at Orleans, and was one among others in getting the Methodist school at Orleans, and many other enterprises in the new country.

She was a charter member of Whitehead Woman's Relief Corps and its first president, and served as one of the department officers of Nebraska.

In March, 1904, she came to Forest Grove, and here united with the Methodist Episcopal church and the Woman's Relief Corps, of which she has twice been chosen president. Last year she served as chairman of the executive board, and at the state encampment at Newport was elected Junior President.

She was a dutiful and loving wife and mother, and very highly respected in all communities where she lived.

She leaves, beside her own family, one brother, Joseph Storms, of Portland and two sisters, Mrs. May Newell, of Bellingham, Washington, and Mrs. Rosa Webb, of Colorado.

Payne Jr., and Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Payne of Hillsboro, D. E. Bomgardner, of Portland.

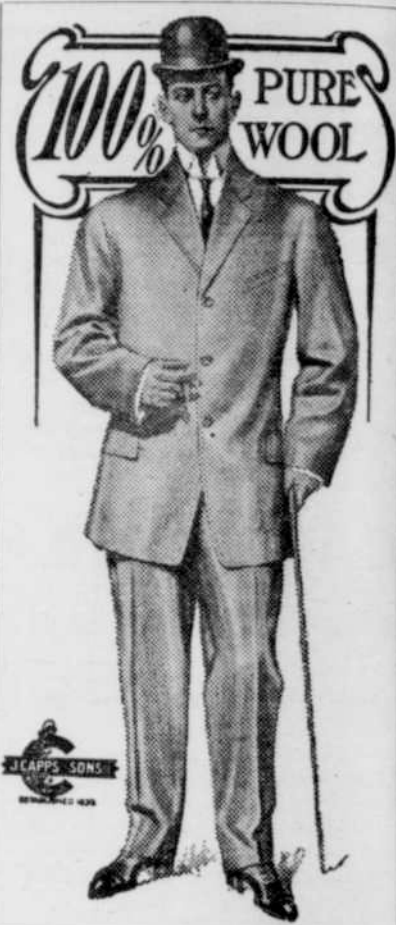
