BRYAN ON PENSIONS.

The inclosure is from the Omaha World Herald, November 18, 1892, Bryan's organ at that time. It follows:

"The next session of Congress will have to wrestle with one deficiency of \$36,000,000. The appropriation for pensions for the next year must not be less than \$150,000,000. It is therefore easy arithmetic to perceive that the appropriation that Congress must make for pensions next session must aggregate not less than \$186,000,000. This tremendous sum would in itself be enough to run a reasonable Government. One would not complain if it were an honest debt, but a large proportion is not debt, because it was never earned by any act of patriotism or heroic service. The Government is held up and despoiled of no mean portion of this, and it seems helpless to defend itself. One cannot help being curious to know how many more years it will take to exhaust the generation which feels itself injured by the war. It is safe to say that never did a generation display such remarkable longevity."

"Shall the people rule?" See the official records of the votes cast in 1896 and 1900.

In reply to the Roosevelt letter, Bryan attacks the Roosevelt policies. And yet he claims to have originated most of them.

And this man Hearst, who is saying such mean things about Bryan, is the one whom the Nebraskan recently mentioned in a list of Democrats "fit to be President."

Babes Lost in the Woods.

Jas. May, a teamster for the Wilcox Milling Co., says the Argus, who was in town Tuesday, says that the neighborhood of Vineland, north of this city, was treated to a genuine sensation, last Monday night, when the farmers of that vicinity were called upon to search for two little sons of Joseph Rooks, who were sent for the cows in the evening and failed to return. They searched through the brush and timber for four miles about the Rook ranch, when at 3 o'clock in the morning of the day following, the little tots, who are aged respectively 5 and 6 years, were found on the bank of Big Creek, cuddled up together, with their coats over them trying to keep warm. While badly frightened, the little fellows were none the worse for their long tramp. They heard the shouts of the many searchers several times, but were afraid that the cries might proceed from panthers or other wild animals. To cap the climax, the father, who had gone on an independent search, got lost, but was finally located by two men who were searching for him.

A Serious Accident.

A camping party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis and family and Mrs. Allen and family of Forest Grove, passed through Tillamook last Monday on their way to Netarts to camp with some friends who had preceded them a couple of days. There were nine in the party, and after getting directions and supplies in town, they started out. About a quarter of a mile past the bridge, near the Thompson ranch, the driver of the wagon in turning, cut the corner too closely and overturned the heavy farm wagon, throwing all the occupants out. Mrs. Allen suffered a fracture of the leg. Dr. Boals was called and after setting the limb brought the patient to town where she will remain until able to travel. The balance of the two families have returned to Forest Grove with their outing completely spoiled, but glad that matters are no worse.—Tillamook Herald.
