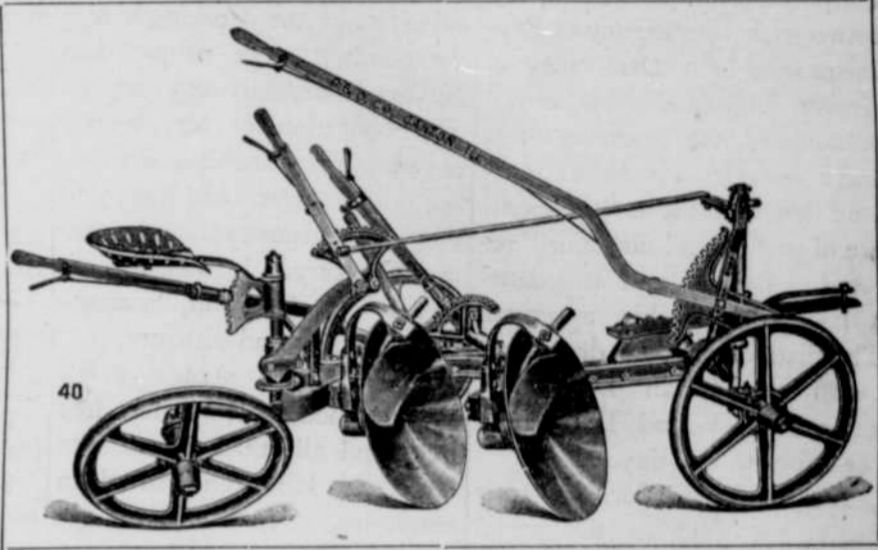

to whom this concert was expected to be unusually attractive on account of the record of the singer in evangelistic work, were conspicuous by their absence. Those who did come were richly repaid. The first number included an old Scotch song—The Mac Gregor's Gathering and the famous "Honor and Arms," from the oratorio of Samson by Handel. This stirring number was written by Handel at a time when the florid methods of the earlier Italian opera still held sway and in which Handel himself had written many operas although with little success. It was not until late in life that he found his real work and that which made him famous—his genius for the oratorio form. This very dramatic aria which has not another equal for the bass voice in any other oratorio is a work of the highest dramatic gifts and is yet unspoiled by the florid runs ordinarily more suited to a light and high soprano voice than to such a heavy voice as a bass. Few basses can equal either the dramatic or technical demands of the number but Mr. Butler overcame the difficulties with ease and brought home to the audience the dramatic essence of the work which is strongly worked out by Handel.

The next number included Tom der Reimer of Loewe, and Infelice from the opera Ernani of Verdi.

The Loewe song is an art song and was one of the gems of the evening. It is beautifully worked out by the composer who has been very generous with his inspiration giving passages of much beauty, equally to the piano as to the voice, and wedding both to the words of the poem in a matchless way that should bring joy to a real musician.

The Infelice is a work of difficulty and a showy work but not one of the best of Verdi. It is only necessary to express the opinion that Mr. Butler

sang it with ease and made the most of it.

The next group, "My Love Nell" and "When Mabel Sings" by Speaks and "The Pauper's Drive" by Homer, were of a different class much lighter but pleasing ballads and were much appreciated by the audience which demanded an encore to which Mr. Butler responded with a light airy trifle amusing if not musical.

The last number closed with "Rolling Down the Rio" by German, words by Kipling, which has a swing to it in the music that admirably suits the flowing verse of the great Kipling. The audience vigorously encored Mr. Butler who repeated the last number. Miss Clapp did very good work in her accompanying and especially in the Loewe song did some very artistic and sympathetic work and in the Handel aria she ably supported the singer.

Forest Grove audiences are already acquainted with Misses Alice Sewell, Leah Leiser and Mr. Dwinell Clapp and everyone may be sure that their playing was enjoyed by all.—Index.
