NOTED SOCIAL QUEEN.

Side Lights on the Career of Mrs. William Astor.

INSTANCE OF HER KINDNESS.

Former New York Society Leader's Timely Generosity to Some Workmen—How She Rebuked an English Officer—Tribute to Her Social Leadership.

Mrs. William Astor, for many years the acknowledged leader of New York society, sat one day in a window of her Fifth avenue mansion watching a gang of men who were excavating a ditch in which to lay the pipes of the New York Steam Heating company. The perspiration was pouring off the men's faces, and an exhausted look had settled over their countenances. She remembered that they had worked continuously through the warm days of the previous week and, calling her butler, sent him to bring the foreman of the gang. Surprised and wondering what could be the matter, the foreman was ushered into the presence of Mrs. Astor. To his still greater surprise, he was invited to form his men in line and march them up to the front of the house. Mrs. Astor then explained that the men must be wearied by their continuous work in the warm weather and said that she wished to give them a little money to purchase refreshment for themselves at their lunch hour. The men were then formed in line, and as each one passed the front steps he received a dollar from the hands of the butler. Meantime Mrs. Astor watched the distribution from her window. The hundred or so men quietly expressed their thanks as they received the little gift. They were employed by Park Commissioner Crimmins. One man who after receiving his dollar again took his place in line and attempted to pass along a second time was discharged by the foreman.

Mrs. Astor, the head of the Astor family, attended during her European tour a garden party in the English midlands.

Mrs. Astor's dignity has been likened to that of a duchess of the old school; hence a certain young officer should have been wiser at the garden party than to say to her as he took out his cigarette case, "Does smoking incommode you, madam?" "I don't know really," Mrs. Astor answered. "No gentleman has ever smoked in my presence."

Amiable and gentle in disposition, Mrs. Astor has been devoid of the aspersed feline traits one is apt to associate with women of fashion. There was never much for her to aspire to. One of fortune's children, she went into the world equipped with wealth, brains and breeding. She never has been compelled to fawn upon the loftier woman. She avoided the humiliation, the character destroying experience of pursuing social position abroad. Her servants, who have adored her, could talk forever about her little kindly deeds, her consideration for others and her unselfishness. In her taste she has been as simple as the woman who used to hem her blankets. Although her guests were dined on the aspecked luxuries of France and off the world renowned Astor gold plate, she used to go to the other extreme. When alone she used to lunch and dine from a small tray with blue and white china of average quality. One of her favorite foods has been rice pudding, and broiled chops and spring chicken have been the backbone of her repasts.

In speaking of the qualifications for the leadership of society that have been possessed by Mrs. Astor, Ward McAllister once said that she had "good judgment and a great power of analysis of men and women, a thorough knowledge of all their surroundings, a just appreciation of the rights of others and, coming herself from an old colonial family, a good appreciation of the value of ancestry, always keeping it near her and bringing it in in all social matters, but also understanding the importance and power of the new element, recognizing it and fairly and generously awarding to it a prominent place. Having a great fortune, she had the ability to conceive and carry out social projects, and this she had done always with success, ever ready to recognize ability and worth and give to it advice and assistance—above all things, a true and loyal friend in sunshine or shower."

Nine o'clock was Mrs. Astor's stipulated time for arriving at the opera house. Mrs. Astor never entered her box when the auditorium was lighted. She waited for the lights to be lowered and then took her place so silently that no one saw her. She was always assisted by some of her guests. Once in her scarlet velvet chair, she threw back her shoulders proudly. Her carriage was as erect as any woman's in the place, and her general attitude never changed. Men came in droves to bid her good evening.

AGAINST WIVES' DRUGGERY.

Women Vote For \$15,000 Fund For a Domestic Science Scholarship.

"What effect, think you, will an endless round of cleaning and scrubbing, washing and ironing have upon the human soul? How far toward the ideal in moral and spiritual development will such a soul be able to advance?" When Mrs. Anna C. Tillinbush of Titusville, Pa., recently made this remark before the session of the State Federation of Women's Clubs in Pittsburgh there was a cheer from all the ladies assembled, and a resolution that a fund of \$15,000 be created for a "domestic science scholarship at State college" went through without a dissenting vote.

There had been much discussion as to the duties of the wife or daughter in a home, and many seemed agreed that it was all right to patch and mend, but that "druggerly" was the common mistake of many wives. It was finally decided that the scholarship at the State College of Pennsylvania should be known as the Kate Cassatt McKnight memorial named in memory of a Pittsburgh woman who formerly did much for the wives and mothers of Pittsburgh. The idea of the memorial will be to teach how a home should be kept right.

PAPER DEVOID OF CRIME.

It Will Be Published by the Christian Scientists in Boston.

The Christian Science Sentinel of Boston announces the establishment of a new daily paper to be known as the Christian Science Monitor. The announcement in part is as follows:

It will be the mission of the Monitor to publish the real news of the world in a clean, wholesome manner, devoid of all the sensational methods employed by so many papers. French Suffragette Wants to Teach Her Sex Necessity For Violence.

Dr. Madeline Pelletier, one of the leaders of the French-women's political movement, has at last the courage to be logical, says a cable dispatch from Paris. She is not the sort to burst into tears and shriek "Coward!" when faced with the inevitable result of lawless acts. She is prepared to go all the way. Accordingly she is heading a petition to parliament to pass a law enabling women to do military service. It will teach them the necessity for violence in which alone their victory lies. Gymnastics and marching will do them good.

"SPORTS A DISEASE."

School Athletes Exalted to Demigods, Says Chicago Educator.

Football and American sports in general have become a national disease, according to President O. C. Schneider of the Chicago board of education. He was led to this declaration through the criticism of Superintendent of Schools Cooley, who complained of the physical culture work in the high schools.

"Our system of sports in the high schools is anything but educational," said Mr. Schneider. "The youngsters that do the playing are taught that they are better than their fellows. If they can beat some one else, they are exalted like demigods. It has reached a time when so-called sport is really a disease."

Gospel Bearing Galleon.

A sixty foot auxiliary gasoline schooner is to spread the gospel in the south seas, says a San Francisco dispatch. The vessel recently completed and launched is named the Hiram Bingham and is intended for use of the missionaries of the Gilbert Islands, where travel by water is an important essential to efficiency. At the time of the launching she was blessed by clergymen and consecrated to the work.

FINE FLORAL WONDER.

Chrysanthemum Three Feet High Has Five Hundred Blossoms.

TWENTY FEET IN DIAMETER.

Private Car Needed to Take Golden Beauty Grown at Madison, N. J., to Chicago Flower Show—"A World Beater," Declares Gardener Who Planted It Last February.

Solomon in all his glory has been outdone by a mere chrysanthemum.

In the spacious greenhouses of the Hamilton McK. Twombly estate at Madison, N. J., the haughty Japanese flower was seen arrayed in such gorgeous attire that even its own little daisy ancestor would never recognize this magnificent monarch. Although only the cream of chrysanthemum society has ever been allowed to break into bloom in the recherche circles of the Twombly bothouses, this year a new and more marvelous bud will make her debut, one that is destined to make even the aristocratic and prize winning dowagers lift up their swelled heads and marvel, for the debutante chrysanthemum, though an infant of only nine months, has already acquired 500 blossoms to her slim young stalk and boasts a diameter of twenty feet, so that when traveling about on exhibition she needs must have a whole private car of her own.

To meet this Broodingagian specimen face to face a New York Evening World reporter journeyed out to Madison the other day, and there, surrounded by an admiring throng of sister chrysanthemums, the 500 header stood. The more the merrier seemed to be the motto of this fat young thing, for bulging blossoms burst from every available space. Five hundred good sized golden heads, all gayly nodding acknowledgment of the wondering gaze, promptly challenged the flower world to match their charms with hers.

But none dared come too close to the haughty though corpulent debutante, for her burdened branches, stretching out ten feet on all sides, made admiration permissible only at long distance. While this stupendous specimen of the Japanese flower is the long of it in width, it must be confessed she is certainly the short of it in height, for, standing in solitary splendor upon a shelf all her own, she only reaches the three foot mark when stretching to her utmost.

But lack of inches doesn't disturb the vanity of the youthful debutante, for, lifting her yellow heads to the admiring gaze of the beholder, she scornfully seems to say to her bothouse companions, "Bear me if you can."

"And there isn't a chrysanthemum in the world that can beat this young beauty," proudly said Arthur Harrington, head gardener of the eighteen greenhouses which stand on the Twombly place and who for nine months has raised this latest floral wonder with the tenderness of a father.

"We planted her last February, just a little shoot from one of the other chrysanthemums, and she has responded to my care just as if she were a human being. When we grow more than one blossom on a branch we pinch out each little shoot and in that way start another bud growing, while with the tall one blossom flower we train all the stray shoots in. Well, I never saw a chrysanthemum grow so many shoots as this golden headed one did. They simply sprouted out by the hundreds, and every day we'd find a dozen or more blossoms to greet us. She just started in to beat the record, and she has certainly succeeded, for there probably isn't another flower of this kind in the world which can boast of 500 blossoms.

"She's the pet of the greenhouses, and there isn't anything fine enough for her, we think. Of course she'll have a private car when we take her to the Chicago flower show, for she couldn't get in with any others, she's such a size.

"And she isn't a pampered or petted flower either. This little beauty didn't need any certain temperature or other cares like the orchid or numerous flowers of delicate constitution. She's a hardy girl with a fine sand setting, and nothing short of a cyclone will mar her beauty. It's a one best bet to say she's the finest chrysanthemum in the world."

Although the 500 header is the acknowledged beauty of the place, chrysanthemums of other varieties run her a close second for wondrous beauty.

Church Built of One Piece.

The only temple in the world whose walls, floor and roof are of one single piece was opened recently at Lake street and Forest avenue, Oak Park, a suburb of Chicago. It is built of reinforced concrete, on the Edison plan, of continuous material with no seams. The temple belongs to Unity congregation.
