Formal announcement of the engagement of Miss Maud Shannon, of this city, and Hon. E. B. Tongue, of Hillsboro, was made at the session of the Fleur de Lis club last Thursday which met at the home of Mrs. John Wilson Macrum. The announcement was made in a rather unique manner and was read by Mrs. Willis Goff, the secretary of the club, from a document prepared after the form of an indictment, Cupid being the complainant. Miss Shannon who has been one of the most active members of the organization, was the recipient of many congratulations from the members and felicitations from friends have followed from that day. The wedding will take place January 2. The prominence of the principals in Forest Grove and Hillsboro social circles will make the affair one of the chief society events of the new year.

Obituary.

James Boldrick passed peacefully away at 9:30 p. m. on the 12th of November at the family residence, "North Mount" in Forest Grove, Oregon. His death came as a great shock and surprise to his family although he had been an invalid for many years. Mr. Boldrick came to Forest Grove in quest of health, June 16, 1905 and for a time appeared to improve and hope for his recovery was entertained but a severe attack of the gripe in the winter of '07 weakened him considerably and he never fully recovered. He has been slowly and painfully sinking ever since from nervous prostration and passed away at the age of 64 years, 2 months and 27 days. The funeral was held at his late residence at 2 p. m. November 14 and conducted by Rev. Hiram Gould, assisted by Rev. Mr. Belknap, of Hillsboro, who spoke very feelingly to the bereaved ones.

There was a large number present and many followed the remains to the Forest View cemetery where the interment took place. The grave had been very thoughtfully arranged by kind friends. The pall bearers were Messrs. Hollinger, Show, Traver and Green. The floral tributes were many and very pretty.

Mr. Boldrick was born in Canifon, Ontario, Canada, August 15, 1844. When a young boy the family moved to the Sixth Concession of Thurlow where he resided the greater part of his life on a farm. He was also the president of the Bronk cheese factory for twelve years but ill health forced him to resign. He was married Aug. 30, 1882 to Miss Amanda Homan, of the same place, two children were born to them, who died in their infancy and were followed to the grave four years later.

Mr. Boldrick married a second time to Miss Theresa Ketcheson November 13, 1889, of Raudon, who with their two daughters, Amanda and Dorothy survive him. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Sarah A. Grier of Dresden, Ont.; and brothers, John of Belleville, Ont.; Thomas, of Denison, Texas; Richard, of Des Moines, Iowa; and George, of this place.

Mr. Boldrick has been a staunch Methodist nearly all his life, having joined when a young man. The family have the sympathy of the community.
