SUBMITS TO PEOPLE

GERMAN EMPEROR PLEDGES HIMSELF TO OBEY THE CONSTITUTION.

Von Buelow Secures Promise to Stop Talking—Nation of One Opinion.

Berlin, Nov. 18.—Forced by the angry tide of popular feeling that swept the empire from end to end, Emperor William has yielded to the nation and promised henceforth to conform himself to the constitutional methods of conducting the policies of Germany.

The interview between the Emperor and the Imperial Chancellor took place at the new palace in Potsdam yesterday and at its conclusion the Emperor made formal promise to his people that in the future he would not act except through the Chancellor and his associate ministers. This

promise was made public in the official gazette of the empire.

Prince von Buelow told the Emperor that he bore the mandate of the rulers of Bavaria, Wurtemberg, Saxony and Baden, the most powerful states in the empire outside of Prussia, to communicate to His Majesty their collective hope that he would be more reticent in the future.

CHINA'S RULERS DEAD

Dowager Empress and Emperor of China Die in Peking.

Peking, Nov. 16.—The Board of Foreign Affairs has announced the death of Tze Hsi An, the Dowager Empress of China, autocratic head of the government, which she had directed without successful interference since 1861, and without protest since 1891.

The announcement of the Dowager Empress' death followed closely upon the announcement of the death of Kwang Hsu, the Emperor.

An edict was issued placing upon the throne Prince Pu Yi, the 3-year-old son of Prince Chun, the Regent of the Empire.

RECOMMENDS LARGE APPROPRIATIONS.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 18.—The annual report of the Chief of Army Engineers, made public today, recommends a liberal appropriation for the waterways of the Pacific Northwest, and these estimates will form the basis of appropriations to be made in the forthcoming river and harbor bill.

DOINGS IN OREGON

Interesting Items Gathered From All Parts of the State.

State Will Need Large Fund.

Salem—It seems altogether probable that appropriations for state purposes for the biennial period 1909-10 will pass the \$3,000,000 mark. Though only a few of the state institutions and departments have made their reports recommending appropriations for the ensuing two years, it is apparent that the increase in population of the state and consequent increase in business at state departments makes a general increase in almost every item of expense.

There is a strong demand for the creation of an insurance department, a state board of control and for the enactment of a comprehensive water code with a provision for state administration. The state will be asked to help build a home for the Oregon Historical Society.

There is also a demand from Eastern Oregon that scalp bounties be restored. Agitation has been strong for some time in favor of state aid for public roadbuilding. The bill for erection of armories by the state will probably be renewed in another form, though defeated by the people last June.

The crowded condition of the State Insane Asylum and the proportions that institution has attained, makes it necessary that a separate institution be provided, and it is generally believed that an appropriation will be made for a branch asylum somewhere in Eastern Oregon.

Banker Faces Serious Charge.

Portland—A. B. Connelly said to be the millionaire wheat king of the Grand Ronde Valley and prominent LaGrande banker, is accused by the Portland police of kidnaping from his home city Gertrude Williams, a 16-year-old girl. Mr. Connelly was accosted last week at the Union Depot by Mrs. Lola Baldwin, of the police department, and the girl taken from his custody.

Government Land to Be Opened.

Roseburg—On January 20, 1909, there will be thrown open for entry at the Roseburg Land Office 91,950 acres of dairying, fruit and timber lands, which will be withdrawn from the Umpqua forest reserve, and which are situated in Coos, Western Land and Douglas counties. The proposed railroad from Drain to Marshfield runs through a portion of this tract.
