Poultry products are commanding a higher price than for many months. Turkey and chicken quotations have soared for the holiday season. It seems to be so throughout the state. Eggs are scarce and have been for several weeks and the consequence the price of eggs went to 50c a dozen, about the highest price ever paid for chicken fruit in this county, remarks the Tillamook Headlight.

The United Railways, now building down the Linnton road and eventually seeking a line into Washington county has filed on extensive water rights along East Dairy Creek. The filing covers the use of the stream for irrigation and power and for energy for electric lighting and all other purposes. The headgate is to be at Denny Ford, 15 miles north of Hillsboro. A canal will be constructed to carry the water in places and the fall will permit the generating of much power. This is supposed to be used eventually for the power plant for the new line. The filling covers a great deal of that formerly filed on by Life Peace, who has allowed his rights to lapse.

Tremendous interest is manifested throughout Oregon, Washington and British Columbia in the great fruit gathering which will convene in Portland under the auspices of the State Horticultural Society and Northwest Fruit Growers' Association December 1st to 4th. The twenty premium boxes of apples purchased by the Portland Commercial Club will give five boxes each to King Edward of England, Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany, Czar Nicholas of Russia, and President Fallieres of France, after being exhibited in Macy's show windows in New York. The Pacific Northwest is going to carry off important prizes at the National Horticultural Congress in Council Bluffs, Iowa, December 14th to 19th, if united effort counts for anything.

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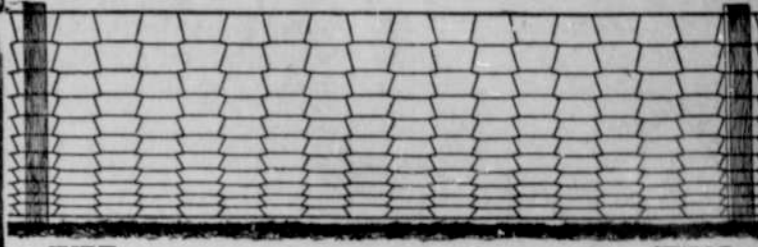
