valuable for spraying very delicate foliage or for use against insects which are killed only by large amounts of poison since it can be used upon plants in much stronger solutions than the other food poisons without injury to the foliage. Experience shows this to be among the best if not the very best of the remedies now used for the codling moth. For the first spraying, soon after the blossoms fall, I still prefer to use Paris green, but for the later applications I prefer the arsenate of lead. One spraying with Paris green followed by four applications of arsenate of lead gave 98 per cent of apples free from worms. On check trees not sprayed approximately 40 per cent of the fruit was wormy.
