## INDOOR MEET GOES

### TO Y. M. C. A.

#### P. U. MAKES FINE SHOWING IN DISTANCES

In the first athletic effort of the year and practically the first indoor dual meet ever participated in by P. U., Hahn's men made a good showing for themselves at the Portland Y. M. C. last Friday. While the final score was against us there was much to be proud of and it is encouraging to think that under somewhat more favorable conditions victory would have been ours. The team had done all its training on the outdoor track hence was handicapped greatly. There is little doubt but that with a few nights training indoors Robinson could easily have beaten his competitors in the 440. The team was given a good square deal in every respect and all decisions were fair and honest.

P. U.'s ill luck began in the final of the 35 yd. dash when Ben Mayfield, in his desperate efforts to win after getting a poor start, caught his toe on the floor and fell. There is little doubt but that Ben would have won first place as he had ran the preliminary much faster than they run the finals. The mile run was good, Austin having practically no competition for final honors. Lancefield showed up well and won an easy third. In the High jump Austin encountered some pretty good men and was only able to pull out a third place. The three mile race was by far the prettiest event in the evening and though it was very evident from the start that Austin would win first place great interest centered about the struggle for second home.

Koch run a plucky race and about the middle of the last mile succeeded in passing Peterson of the Y. M. C. A. He got a lead of about 10 yards and the crowd was beginning to see visions of his winning second place. Peterson however had a stronger finish and in the last five laps easily passed him winning second place. Throughout the meet Pacific seemed to surpass in the distance runs. The relay race at the close of the meet was close, Y. M. C. A. winning by a small margin.
