The Forest Grove Colts were victorious in the first game of the season which they played in Hoffman park last Sunday, defeating the Columbia Steel Works nine by a score of 7 to 6.

Kopple was the first man at the plate for the home team and made a hard try for the first stop-over when the man behind the swipe-stick dropped the third strike, but failed to beat the throw. The Colts continued to score each inning, except in the fourth and fifth when Van, Getter and Moore each scored with two men down, making a total of seven tallies to the good.

There was nothing doing around the home plate for the steel workers who failed to hit or score up to the fourth, when some timely hits combined with costly fielding errors allowed four scores, putting them in the lead which position they held up to the seventh by scoring in each of the next two innings, being unable to make the circuit after the sixth inning, the game ending after the first of the ninth.

The weakest point of the visiting team was in the catcher, the Colts repeatedly stealing to second, while Getter was there with as sure a whip to second as ever, and after a few attempts to steal on the part of the visitors, they gave it up as a dear proposition. Kelly was out-pitched by Moore, who placed 13 men in the down and out club, and allowed but 8 hits, while Kelly fanned but 8, and was walloped for the lucky 11. The Colts, if they had placed their hits closer to the ground and refrained from the fly lifting exhibition, would have placed several more scores to their credit. However, the playing was all that could be expected and gives promise of some good games during the summer. Wm. Schultz umpired in a fair and entirely satisfactory manner.
