Catching, settled on a donation land claim in this section. Mr. Catching died many years ago, and his widow had lived in Portland for the past twenty-five years. When the couple first came to Oregon Portland consisted of six log cabins. Of thirteen children born to Mr. and Mrs. Catching, the following survive: Mrs. R. C. B. B. dra, Hillsboro; B. F. Catching, Wardner, Idaho; Mrs. A. C. Levens, Portland; W. A. Catching and Charles H. Catching, Missoula, Montana.
