Especial attention is called to the fact that this fund cannot be used for the erection of buildings or the purchase of apparatus; this must be done by the district in which the school is located.

At the present time, Forest Grove and Hillsboro have each a four year accredited high school, but there should be several more in the county, as Cornelius, Gaston, Dilley, Banks and other districts are all doing high school work and would therefore be greatly benefited by the adoption of this measure.

Too much cannot be done to further the cause of education, and the passage of the "High School Fund" bill at the November elections will mean a higher standard of citizenship, with a consequent greater and better Washington county in the future. ty High School Fund".
