RED APPLES HIGH IN EAST.

Boston Pays 12-1-2c Apiece for Wenatchee Winter Bananas.

Wenatchee — Returns from apple shipments sent out of the Wenatchee valley during the last 30 days reveal conditions in other parts of the country. Many of the growers drop in the boxes their name and address, asking that the purchaser of the apples state the price paid and the condition of the apples.

John Scott, a local grower, received this reply from the purchaser of some Winter Banana apples from a carload which he shipped to Boston a few weeks ago:

"Dear Sir: Found your notes and would say that the apples cost me 2 for 25 cents and were in fine condition. I bought them at 122 Tremont street, Boston, at a specialty shop. C. H. Cox, 551 South street, Boston."

William Edmund received a check for \$1,152, the net proceeds from the first carload shipped to England. The shipment consisted of Duchesne, Grimes Golden, Wealthy and Jeffries, not considered first class varieties in this valley, but the fruit netted Mr. Edmund \$1.92 a box.

MANY SHIPPING APPLES.

Seven Carloads Sent From Union Storage Plant at Underwood.

Husum — Among orchardists along the White Salmon river now engaged in hauling apples to the storage plant of the Apple Growers union at Underwood are J. R. and P. B. McCracken, J. E. Slade, William Olson, Robert Fordyce, William Fordyce, James Hendryx, James Miles, Frank McCorchie and R. D. Cameron. Thus far, seven carloads have been shipped from Underwood by the union, New York being the destination for four cars.

The McCrackens lead in shipping the largest number of boxes this season, over 8,000 being the yield from their orchards. As an illustration of the prolific crop, 35 boxes were picked from one York Imperial tree.

A carload of Spitzenbergs and other leading varieties of apples from the orchards of the McCrackens will be exhibited at the National Apple show at Spokane, and also will be displayed in Chicago, where they will be sold.

CUT MATCHES AT NEWPORT

Summers' Plant Will Be Moved From Sandpoint.

Newport — The Summers brothers' match block factory will remove from Sandpoint to Newport and will have the plant ready for operation in this city early in the spring. The company has secured from the I. & W. N. a lease on the building formerly used by the McInnis planer, and five blocks on the Idaho side of town for piling grounds.

White pine for match blocks is being contracted for from small mills in this vicinity. The plant will be served by spurs from both the I. & W. N. and Great Northern.

Summers brothers will also operate a wholesale and retail lumber yard and put in a box factory, and later may install a sawmill to cut white pine from the Kaniku national forest.

D. U. Gildea has begun the erection of a shingle mill and box factory at Newport on ground leased from the I. & W. N. Two other industries are also being considered for Newport.

FAT PROFITS IN PORKERS.

Jacob Weinhard Nets \$2200 on Hogs in Touchet Valley.

Dayton — That hog raising offers possibilities unsurpassed by any farm industry is the belief of Jacob Weinhard, a pioneer business man of Dayton, who recently moved to his country seat, "Hohenstaufen." Since the first of the year Mr. Weinhard has sold \$2,000 worth of porkers, and expects to increase this revenue by at least \$500 before 1911.

The cost of maturing the marketable swine amounted to less than \$300, leaving a net profit of \$2,200. Figuring as Mr. Weinhard does the cost of production is less than 12 per cent, a figure which shows that wheat growing, orcharding, sheep raising and cattle raising must take a back seat. With closer and better markets afforded by the establishing of packing-houses at Spokane, Portland and Seattle, interest in hog raising is growing.

In One Hill 16 1-2 Pounds Potatoes

Dunn — August Pearson has on exhibition 16 1/2 pounds of potatoes, the yield of one hill. Two of the tubers weigh three and a half pounds each. They were grown on ground that had not been fertilized.

Pays \$1,400 for Six Mules.

Garfield — Edward Byrne, a wealthy farmer living two miles east of town, purchased six mules, for which he paid \$1,400 cash.

NEW WHEAT PERFECTED.

Quality Equal to Any, and Hardest Variety Known.

Spokane — J. L. Harper, a practical farmer at Waitsburg, Wash., has succeeded in producing sufficient seed of an unknown variety of wheat to sow one and a half acres to what is declared to be the hardest grain grown in the Northwest. Experts at the state of Washington college and master agriculturists in other parts of the Pacific country have not been able to classify the grain, though they say it is likely to become a heavy producer. The head is similar to club wheat, but the grain is harder. Harper found seven stalks on his 1,020-acre ranch near Waitsburg four years ago, and from five stalks, which were carefully cultivated in a garden patch for two years, he made six pecks, which will be sown next spring. In giving out the foregoing information Harper said he has no bonanza or wonder seed wheat to sell, nor does he believe the new grain will yield more than the average Northwestern crop. However, he claims it is sufficiently hardy to grow in any part of the United States or Canada.

Big Hay Warehouse.

Kittitas — Capable of holding 3,000 tons of hay, the Galbraith & Bacon warehouse in Kittitas, a town of 200, is the largest storage warehouse in central Washington. The floor dimensions are 80x200 feet, making 16,000 square feet of storage space. This is one of two large warehouses here, the other being that of Walker & Kilmore, which is 50x100 feet.

Eggs Five Cents Apiece.

Tacoma — Eggs are soaring in Tacoma. They climbed to 60 cents for strictly fresh stock, an advance of 2 cents in the past few days, and the highest price ever known to the retail trade in Tacoma. Wholesalers have not advanced figures from 46@47 cents, however. Few eggs are coming into market.
