## PAVEMENT BEING RAPIDLY COMPLETED

The street pavement is being completed as rapidly as possible. Pacific Avenue from A Street to Second Street was the first to be finished. Main Street from N. 1st to 3rd Avenue, South, North 1st Avenue from College Way to A Street, and A Street from N. 1st to Pacific Avenue, 3rd Avenue S. from A Street to Second Street have already been completed. This makes in all 15 blocks with the following yet to be paved: First Street from 3rd Avenue S. to Pacific Avenue and Council Street in all 5 blocks. Much of the rock has already been placed and by the time of our next issue, if the weather permits, the 20 blocks within our city will have been paved with bitulithic hard surface pavement. This is the first step toward adding permanent city features to this most excellent suburb of Portland.

## W. V. & C. R. CO.'S RAILROAD COMPLETED

Tracks of the Willamette Valley and Coast Railway Company, which have been under construction this summer by the Lovegren timber interest into the Patton Valley section, are completed, and trains will be running in a short time, following which machinery for the large sawmill, which will be built at Cherry Grove, the new town site, will be shipped in and installed.

When the road is ready for regular traffic, passenger coaches will be added to the equipment of the line, and a regular daily schedule established. Although it is planned to make Cherry Grove an important sawmill center, many other enterprises will be undertaken, including the manufacture of tile and brick.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY PIONEER DIES

Chas. Burnham, a resident of Tigardville, Washington Co., died at his home Sunday evening, and was buried in the Tigardville cemetery. Mr. Burnham had been a resident of Tigardville for 28 years. He was born in 1835 and came to the United States when 16 years of age. He came to Oregon in 1869 and lived on the Jerome Porter place west of Forest Grove, afterward moving down on the Tualatin River near here, where his wife died. From here he moved to Tigardville, where he has since resided. Mr. Burnham was married in Illinois in 1858 to Miss Mary E. Higby. Eleven children were born to them.

## COUNTY TREASURER JACKSON IS DEAD

County Treasurer Wm. Jackson died this morning at 20 minutes to 9 o'clock. Mr. Jackson was on duty at his office until 10 a. m. yesterday. He left his office for a walk and while passing the Delta Drug Store was stricken with paralysis. He was removed to his home but never regained consciousness.

Mr. Jackson was serving his eighth year as county treasurer. He was 64 years of age and leaves a wife and two children, Mrs. R. C. Vaughn, of Hillsboro; and Walter Jackson, of Portland. The funeral of Mr. Jackson will be in charge of the Masons, of which order he was a prominent member. Mr. Jackson was elected from the Dillely precinct, where he owned a small farm and had resided for a number of years.
