**SELLING EGGS AND POULTRY**  
Market Side of Business Would Require at Least Twenty Acres of Land and Big Flock.

It takes time and patience to get a good market for eggs and select stock. I would not sell to dealers, as better prices can be secured by selling direct to consumers, writes E. A. Berg of Chesterton, Ind., in the Chicago Daily News. To go into the chicken business and cater only to the market side would require the handling of more stock and a larger area than would be required in catering to the fancy side of the business. The demand for standard bred stock with certain requirements, a fowl with plenty of meat and one that lays the winter eggs, is exceptionally good and also surprising.  
In the fancy line poultry beginners are demanding a fowl that is a good winter layer, as the winter eggs bring in the most profits. My experience is, in selling fancy stock, that the demand is greater than the supply.

There is a good profit in the chicken business the securing of which depends on a man's perseverance and patience. The market side of the business would require at least 20 acres of land and 600 to 800 birds kept. A net profit of \$1,000 to \$1,200 should be made a year. No profits of this size can be figured on until the third year, and a man to make an exclusive business of it would require enough to live on through the first year.

It isn't so much the capital you have to invest as it is what is in you to make success. In going in the fancy business much depends on the stock started with. As a side line you will find it a good paying proposition.  
Begin small, learn all the details and then gradually increase.  
The chicken business is the same as any other business that pays—it takes time. Most failures are from beginning too large before a thorough understanding of all the small details is secured.

**FEARING HARMLESS THINGS?**  
Children Told Not to Touch Harvest Fly, or Locust, Because Its Sting Will Kill.  
(By PROF. A. G. MC CALL.)  
We have quite enough to fear without adding to our list the names of those things that are harmless. Many children have been told that the harvest fly, or locust, that favors us with its "chee-chee-chee" through the hot days of summer, is not to be touched because its sting will kill. Why should this fly, which has no stinger, be feared more than a bumblebee?

If you are able to do so, catch one of these so-called locusts and examine it. Can you learn how its peculiar noise is made?  
(A real locust is what is commonly called a dusty-gray grasshopper, that flies up suddenly from the field or roadside and shows you its black-striped wings.)  
The dragon-fly, so often called snake feeder or snake doctor, perches itself on the tip of a weed, bullrush, or small limb near the water. On one of these it waits for a mosquito to appear. While on a fishing excursion some afternoon this summer, watch this industrious little fellow secure his dinner of mosquitoes. If by mistake he should fly into your house or schoolhouse, do not fear in the least to handle him, for he is harmless.

**The Boy on the Farm.**  
The farm boy is the future farmer and the potential general, senator and president, says the Kansas Farmer.  
He helps to build the farms and homes of the countryside with little reward, except his hope of inheritance. He has practical knowledge, but small financial interest. His business sense is undeveloped, his responsibilities minimized and his servitude prolonged, and yet he is a newer and better edition of his sire whose burdens he must bear.  
Fortune gives much to many, but never enough to any, and the parent can well learn that wisdom is often nearer him when he stops to consider the boy than when he soars to larger things. Boy culture is better than a baby beef, and his training than a multitude of harvests.  
Evil is wrought by want of thought when not by want of heart.

**Work Out Problems.**  
In your framing operations don't do things because some one else does them, but figure out the "why" for yourself. It is the farmer who works out his own problems that is the success. Good thinking and good farming go together.
