AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM AFAR

(Continued from last week)

Sunday, Sept., 18, 1910.

The doctor came on board and examined the passengers so late in the morning that we got on shore too late for morning church service. We went ashore about 10:30. Miss Jackson took us at once to the Deaconess' Home, one of our mission institutions. This home is located on a hill. Its structure is typical of this part of the world. As the temperature ranges from 69 to 95 degrees no provision is made for heating. Singapore is a city without chimneys. I have not been in a kitchen, but they do not have any chimneys even there. Rooms are large and ceilings are enormously high compared to those in America. Very wide verandahs surround the houses in order to permit large open spaces and still furnish protection from the sun and from tropical rains. Instead of doors screens are common. As a matter of fact Singapore is not nearly so hot as the hottest weather in Hongkong, Nagasaki, Calcutta, Lucknow, Oregon or Illinois, but as it has no cool season and the air is so damp that books mildew unless varnished or kept in an almost air-tight case life here is more trying than in other places. A short stay gives no inconvenience.

We were cordially received at the Deaconess' Home but they had not room to keep us, so Miss Jackson got us located at Oldham Hall—our boys board school. Here we had a most delightful time with a dozen or more missionaries, most of whom are teachers in the Anglo-Chinese school.

At 5:15 p. m. we attended evening church service in the Methodist Church. How helpful it was to have our own service again! The hour of service seems peculiar to us, but it is explained by the fact that the English dine at any hour from 7 to 9 p. m.

After our 7 o'clock dinner we went for a ride in a double jinrikisha. The principal of the Anglo-Chinese school and I rode in one and his wife and Ina in another. The principal and his wife ride each evening in order to cool off and quiet their nerves before going to bed. A game of tennis is another very popular nerve tonic.

Monday, Sept. 19, 1910.

After breakfast Ina and I started to visit the Anglo-Chinese school. We had our usual experience of getting a long ride because our jinrikisha man could not understand our directions and we did not know the way. We inquired of everyone who looked as if he could speak English and eventually we reached our destination. This school is said to be the largest mission school in the world. It has between 1100 and 1200 pupils. The course extends from the primary to the second year of high school. Oldham Hall is the dormitory of the school. Most of the teachers are Eurasian—mixed European and Asian, Tamil—a native race, and Chinese. The teachers are Christians and they are also capable instructors. About a dozen Americans supervise and teach and several do some preaching as well. The school is entirely self-supporting. Each pupil pays \$2 per month tuition and the government (Straits Settlements (English) gives a generous amount in aid. The principal says that after all expenses are paid he usually has some \$3,000 per year left for repairs and improved equipment. Just now they are rejoicing in a supply of new hat racks—the first the school has ever had.
