### Real Poverty in Japan

In a recent number of the Japan Advertiser in a translation from an article in the Shin Nihon, a Japanese newspaper, by Nagai Ryutaro, about farm conditions in Japan which serve to give the people of the United States some adequate idea of conditions as they actually are in Japan.

The writer points out that but 14% of the landed area of Japan is susceptible of cultivation, the total in acres being but 14,010,000. Yet this limited area is occupied by 4,927,777 separate land owners. Of these, 2,299,714 cultivate farms of less than an acre and a quarter each. 72% of the entire agricultural population is on farms of less than 2.50 acres each. There are in the whole empire but 2,705 farmers each cultivating an area of 125 acres or more.

The degree of their poverty may be judged by the fact that there are 432,759 land owning farmers in Japan delinquent on their taxes this year in an average amount of \$1.20 each which they are unable to pay. Last year there were 50,547 land owning farmers unable to pay government taxes amounting to an average of 77 cents each, whose effects were seized and publicly sold to pay this petty tax, which it was beyond their power to meet.

## AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM AFAR

(Continued from last week)

We visited a dozen or more rooms where recitations were in progress. I was deeply impressed with the skill of the teachers. Many of the pupils were apt, although having to work in a foreign tongue was difficult. Each answer must be in a complete and correct sentence; correct in both grammar and pronunciation. The Chinese are famous map makers and some of the maps made in this school have been published. Most of the work done here is in the lower grades. Many of the pupils are very wealthy, but neither they nor their parents appreciate the value of education and as soon as a boy learns English, Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping he is so profitable in a business way that the rule is that he leaves school after completing the sixth grade. A few have gone to England or America and have completed college courses with credit. The pupils are largely Chinese, although Tamils and Malays are present in considerable numbers. All the Malays are Mohammedans. Not fewer than eight religions are represented in the school. Conversions are frequent.

One true story will interest you. A young married couple came here a few years ago and taught in the school. The woman had a Bible class. After 16 months' service she died and it seemed that little had been done. Soon after her death one of the boys in her Bible class professed Christianity and ascribed his conversion to her teaching. This boy had a remarkable intellect and in course of time he became minister to the English speaking Chinese Methodist Church.

One day the consul-general of the United States came to the church services and heard from this man a sermon which so attracted him that he continued to attend and was ultimately converted. During the meetings connected with the Laymen's Missionary Movement this same consul-general was a leading speaker. So Mary Wright Pease being dead yet speaketh. The young Chinamen is now a student in Northwestern University.

In the afternoon I visited the Raffles Museum. It would be useless to attempt a description. You can appreciate what a treat it was when I tell you that among the things seen was a very complete exhibit of shells, corals, fishes, sponges and other products of the sea, birds, animals, insects, coins, stamps, baskets, canoes, agriculture implements, idols, models of houses, household utensils, costumes, weapons, made and used by the natives, fruits, vegetables, reptiles, land and marine. When you consider that such an exhibit was in the heart of the tropics (only 77 miles from the equator) you can imagine how rich it must be. An exhibit of several hundred butterflies and moths showed a beauty and variety of coloring such as I had never dreamed of before. A case of birds of paradise and another of pheasants were only a little less brilliant. Ina went shopping and so missed the museum.

Tuesday, Sept. 20, 1910. Breakfast is at 7 o'clock, but Ina and I got up at 6, ate some toast, tea and fruit and went and got a jinrikisha and set out for the botanical gardens and the rubber plantation. We went early in order to see the rubber trees tapped.
