## AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM AFAR

(Continued from last week)

In a place where everything is new the pleasure of a journey is constant from the beginning. We rode past banana plantations, coconut groves with bushels of coconuts, gigantic palms, betel nut trees, tangles of vines, multitudes of parasitic plants, whole rows of Chinese laundries with fields of clothes line, a large Chinese cemetery with graves like little cyclone cellars, gardeners with baskets of vegetables on their heads, a large nursery full of strange plants, clumps of graceful bamboo, water carriers with two large buckets on a long pole, the military barracks where the soldiers were drilling, people like the Easter card—assorted designs, no two alike—goats, chickens, children, suburban dwellings—and all this in the coolness of the morning on our way to the botanical gardens. The gardens were large and extremely well kept. Trees, shrubs and plants were labelled. After a short visit to the gardens we proceeded to the rubber plantation. Here we found several thousand rubber trees ranging in age from young plants to 31 year old trees. As trees can be tapped when four or five years old, many of these give a large flow of rubber. The trees are tapped in two ways. There is a perfect craze for rubber here. Fortunes are being made in the business. Only today four Christian Chinese, who only a few years ago were abjectly poor, came to the principal of the Anglo-Chinese school to get him to help them sell their crop of rubber. They sold \$2,975 worth. The missionary society put rubber trees on some vacant land and has cleared thousands of dollars on its venture.

After seeing the gardens and the rubber we went back to Oldham Hall, ate our breakfast, and rested until after tiffin (12 o'clock.)

In the afternoon we ran into a Chinese open air theatrical performance. It was a most grotesque thing. A play was being given by two actors and an orchestra of about ten pieces. The acting was chiefly pantomimic and the orchestra kept up a pandemonium of yells and noises. The costumes were quite elaborate when compared with those worn by the audience. No admission was charged. Wealthy Chinese pay the players in order to show their wealth and benevolence. Incidentally a leper who had lost several toes, came along. This reminds me of the boy who joyfully wrote to his mother that he had seen a man killed by the cars.

When the play was over we visited a Chinese temple. Incense was burning before a number of hideous and fantastic gods. The thing that was really most interesting to me here was the inlaid work, embroidery and shell work, some of which showed a large amount of skilful workmanship.

Next we visited the rooms in which an M. E. Chinese girls' primary school meets. School was over for the day. The place was neat, cheerful and fairly well equipped. A very familiar looking leaf cluster was on the wall. These S. S. pictures do excellent service in primary grades in mission schools. (To be continued)

### Would Improve Our City.

Mrs. H. C. Atwell, President of the Woman's Club, addressing the club, in speaking of our city, its surroundings and needs, says in part:

"This, our city, so abundantly provided by nature with shade trees and with undulating surface, located as it is at the foot of the Coast Range of mountains and surrounded by hills on the west and north, which gives to its location one of beauty. That the shade trees should be conservatively preserved by our citizens; that to beautify we should plant within the park strip uniform varieties of shade trees, and recommends for planting Cork Elm, Scarlet Oak, Oriental Palm and European Linden, and that all trees on one street be of uniform varieties; that the council pass an ordinance requiring property owners to keep their walks and streets in front of their property clear of leaves and rubbish; that the trees be trimmed so as not to hinder the carrying of umbrellas.

Recommends the purchase of the south half of the church block to be used by the city as a park.

Recommends the passage of an ordinance, prohibiting expectorating on the walks as a prevention against tuberculosis. She also urges that public sanitary drinking fountains at various places be established and kept by the city.

Concluding she says that we can do nothing except by united effort and concentrated action, and by this would accomplish some new results."

### Death of Noted Athlete.

Ralph Dimick, attorney and noted athlete of Oregon City, who received injuries in the football game on the University grounds here Oct. 14, died at the St. Vincent hospital, in Portland, Sunday. His injuries, complicated with pneumonia, was the cause of his death. On Sunday morning he became delirious and jumped from a second story veranda, at the hospital, and ran some four blocks before his strength failed him. He was carried back, but died twenty minutes later. Mr. Dimick was an athlete of wide renown, his talents being first brought into play while attending the Pacific University 1903-1904, where he excelled in football and track work. He, together with his friends, Tilbrook and Spagle, have lead the successes of many college teams.

Mr. Dimick has many friends among his schoolmates and townsmen of this city. At the time of his death he was twenty-seven years old. Interment was made in the family plot in the Hillsboro cemetery.
