BIG DAM AT CHERRY GROVE

Construction work on a huge dam across Tualatin River at the new townsite, Cherry Grove, will begin at once by the Lovegren Lumber Company in the southeast section of this county, a few miles from the town of Gaston. This dam, which will contain more than 70 acres of water, will float the logs of the company, from which millions of feet of the finished article will be produced.

The company recently completed its railroad into the timber belt and is now erecting a temporary mill, which will have a capacity of 50,000 feet per day. As soon as machinery from the east can be obtained and installed a permanent mill will be established, capable of sawing 150,000 feet a day and providing for the employment of upward to 350 men.

The Lovegren interests own large tracts in that locality and are constantly adding to their holdings, having recently purchased an acreage cruising several million feet. Several residences are being built at Cherry Grove and by spring a live community will be located.
