### Country Merchants Stand Pat

The evil wrought by mail order houses in country towns is extended, perpetuated and encouraged by the indifference of the merchants. In the opinion of the writer there is only one method to pursue in battling catalogue peddlers.

Several years ago the merchants of a small Middle Western town were confronted, or rather affronted, by the appearance of a large box car on their railroad siding filled with articles to be distributed among the farmers and residents of the country. A hurried meeting of the business men's association was called and the writer was employed to secure the names of those who received goods from the mail order specialists. Upon receipt of these names, the association mailed a letter to each person informing them that in the future no member of the association could or would issue credit to those who received goods from box car merchants or mail order houses.

A stand of this kind in any community will have a strong effect. No resident will oppose the edict as unreasonable. He cannot expect to send his cash away and still claim the indulgence of his home merchants. Even though his credit and paying habits be of the best, he is still a retarding factor in local progress and should be forced to see the question from the standpoint of the merchant.—Ex.

### Refused Credit Now

A merchant in western Kansas is playing the part of the villain in the show. During the good times when everybody had money he quietly went to work to collect a list of the patrons of mail order houses. He used several methods to secure them and succeeded in getting a pretty complete list, which he filed away for future reference. Now all the crops are burned up there, money is scarce and the people need credit. When a man steps into the store of the merchant and asks for credit he hunts up his list, and if the man's name is there he tells him to go and ask for credit where he spent cash. The revenge is tough, but really can you blame him much?—Ex.

### Hillsboro Gets Natatorium.

Subscriptions are being taken for stock in a corporation formed for the purpose of building a natatorium and gymnasium combined at Hillsboro. On the first floor is to be the swimming pool, dressing rooms, balcony for spectators, with gymnasium in the rear, while the second floor is to be a large assembly room and cabinets for permanent exhibits of the county's produce. The total cost is estimated at about \$17,000.
