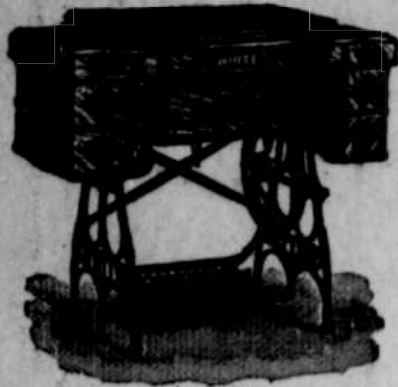

AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM AFAR

(Continued from last week)

Here we were asked to drink tea and if we had done so we should of course have paid for it. The splendor of the temples and the list of those who had each given \$10,000 to its support made me wish for more consecration of the Christian purse. How Christian lands do rob the Lord in tithes and offerings! A peculiar method of worship was an automatic prayer wheel. Another was this: A lot of flat sticks, numbered, were placed in a jar, shaken, and the protruding one withdrawn. The prescription corresponding in number to this stick was then prescribed for the sick.

Wednesday, Sept. 28, 1910. Even the Bay of Bengal can be quiet while we pass over it. Land birds begin to appear on the rigging of the ship, although we do not expect to reach Calcutta for two more days.

Some time ago I wrote that I would sometime describe some of our new fruits. The chicos is shaped somewhat like a smooth Irish potato. It is soft and eaten with a spoon after being cut in two. The papaya is about the shape and size of a muskmelon and is eaten in the same manner. It tastes a little like a papaw. The pomelo is about the size of grape fruit or perhaps larger. It is pulled apart with the fingers. Red bananas are also new to us. Penang has about eight varieties of bananas.

Thursday, Sept. 29, 1910. We were impressed with the magnitude of the Ganges river this morning when we had to take on a pilot while still fifty miles from land. The silt brought down by the river makes the contour of the ocean bed shifting at even so great a distance. A pilot ship rides at anchor and furnishes pilots for all vessels. Calcutta is 120 miles from the coast. We will have to wait for the tide to float us over the bar. Our course is up the Hoogly river—a river of the Ganges delta—to the Ganges and up the Ganges to Calcutta.

Ships that pass in the night signal to each other by making use of the Morse telegraph code indicated by means of flashes of electric light. Tomorrow is our wedding anniversary. We expect to celebrate by landing in India.

Friday, Sept. 30, 1910. Our first introduction to India was a view of the low sand spits of the lower delta of the Ganges. As we proceeded trees began to appear and soon after we began to see farms and villages. The delta is being brought under cultivation by Indians who are aided by the government. No taxes are paid for five years and some aid is given in securing stocks and implements. The delta presents a pleasing appearance with its green fields, date palms, large herds of cattle and sheep, picturesque mud villages looking like clusters of huge hay shocks, peculiar fishing craft and crowds of active natives. Extreme flatness is a drawback from a scenic point of view. I have little doubt but that a nearer view would show a vast amount of unattractive filth, but "where ignorance is bliss 'tis folly to be wise." One thing that we can see the natives engaged in is loading great barges with rice straw and towing them from the point of production to where they want to use them.

This enormous delta is the pest of navigation and the delight of geographers and sportsmen. It has been formed by the earth washed down by the Ganges during the ages. It must comprise at least 10,000 square miles. The trouble to navigators arises from the fact that the channel is constantly changing so that soundings and chartings are continually necessary. Geographers cite this as a marked example of erosion and sportsmen find parts of the delta swarming with tigers and other big game.

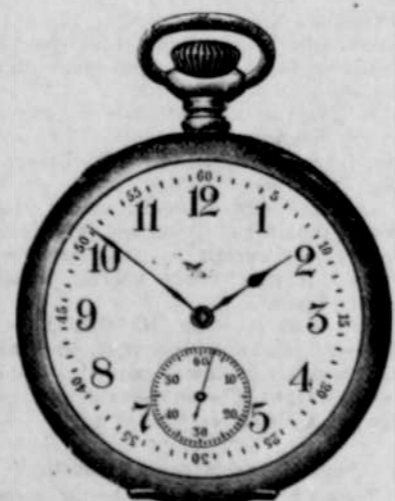
