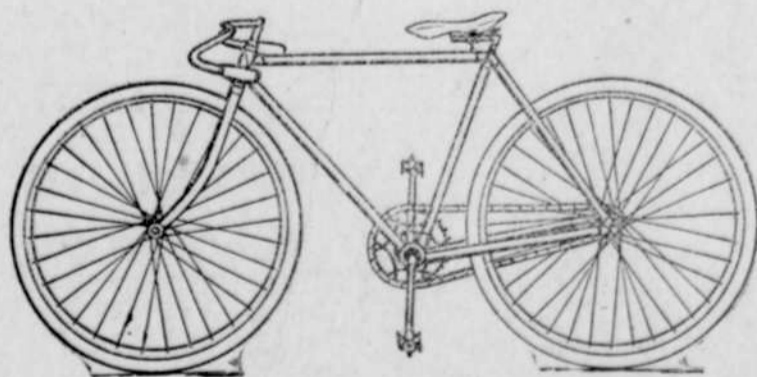

FRUIT MEN IN SESSION

The fruit growers' meeting held Saturday at the K. P. hall was largely attended by growers and others. Much interest was manifested.

Mr. Holt, president of the Eugene growers' association; H. J. Boshaw of the Nooksack growers' association, and Mr. Goodrich of the state horticultural commission, delivered very interesting addresses on the lines of growing and caring for fruits.

Mr. Mulkey represented the Southern Pacific interests, and a letter was read from the Oregon Electric people, the railroad companies showing their interest in the future development of this section and their willingness to encourage the move by offering a half rate for shipments.

Hon. Ira Purdin made a nice talk from a grower's standpoint and urged that the time is ripe for something definite to be done.

Hon. H. C. Atwell, president of the State Horticultural Association, was chairman, and spoke encouragingly of the possibilities.

After hearing all that was said, it was the unanimous opinion that a cannery or evaporator, or both, in connection with a packing and shipping plant, is needed and would result in financial good to promoters and be of great benefit to the community.

The chair appointed a committee of five to prepare plans for future proceedings, naming Mayor Allen, Robt. Alexander, John Forbes, Grant Bailey and B. Ortman. The committee will deliberate, and when ready with report a meeting will be called for definite action.

Everything bids fair for the establishment of the plant here this spring.
