Our Presidential Possibilities Series

WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT

No uncertainty attaches to the candidacy of the president for a renomination. "Nothing but death can keep me out of the fight now," were the words in which he stated his attitude. Until his appointment in 1900 as first civil governor of the Philippines his public career had been entirely judicial. In 1903 he declined an appointment by President Roosevelt to the supreme court and the next year accepted the war portfolio in his cabinet. He "kept the lid on" in Cuba as provisional governor in 1906. By order of the president in 1907 he visited Panama, Cuba and Porto Rico and later the Philippines and Japan, returning by way of Russia, his nomination for the presidency following soon after his return. He received 321 electoral votes as against 162 cast for William Jennings Bryan.
