Robert Marion La Follette, senior senator from Wisconsider ality as a fighter and "mixer" is sufficiently indicated by the nickname of "Eattle Bob," by which he is known among his constituents, a sobriquet which he earned early in his political career. He has been thrice governor of Wisconsin and has served in two congresses as representative. He was elected senator for the term 1905-11 and re-elected for the 1911-17 term. He led the movement to nominate all candidates by direct vote. Prominent among his supporters for the 1912 presidential nomination is Gifford Pinchot, who was the close friend and adviser of President Roosevelt during the latter part of his administration. Senator La Follette received twenty-five votes for the nomination in the last Republican national convention


