

GREEKS LEAVE FOR FRONT.

Illinois Steel Mills Depopulated By Departure of Foreigners.

Chicago-Grave fears are expressed by Gary, Ind., officials that the "Steel City" will be depopulated unless something happens soon that will stop the war in the Balkans. The great steel mills, piled to the limit with orders, are being badly crippled.

Within the last week many Servians, Montenegrins, Greeks and Bulgarians have departed to join the allied army, and now 400 Macedonians have announced that they will cast their lot with Bulgaria in fighting the Turk.

The Macedonians, for the greater part, are outlaws from their native land, and they are entering the conflict in hopes of whipping their country's oppressor and regaining the right to return to their homes.

Their message volunteering service, was received at a mass meeting of 300 Bulgarians. It was one of several from many cities of Northern Illinois and from neighboring states.

M. P. Kaloudoff, president of the Bulgarian society, also received a telegram from Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, in which the war committee of the country asked all countrymen in America to prepare for war and to absent from the consulting room in respond immediately if possible.

All Bulgarians and Greeks to Be Expelled From Country.

Constantinople - Whether for the purpose of furnishing provocation for war or to show the Balkan allies that Turkey cannot be intimidated, the government is acting with an aggressiveness calculated to bring on hostilities. The embargo on Greek ships, the detention of Servian ammunition and the seizure of Bulgarian railway

cars, all constitute belligerent acts. The government is determined to expel all Bulgarians and Greek subjects as soon as war is declared, and these will be transported by steamers few minutes to make. detained for that purpose. Convicts In Wyoming Pen Rush Guards and Escape.

Fight Desperate Battle In Prison-Kill and Wound Citizens - Fight Posses In Mountains.

Rawlins, Wyo.-A battle raged in the state penitentiary Sunday. Locked inside the walls with hundreds of mutinous prisoners, a few guards fought desperately to restore order and prevent a wholesale prison delivery. Camped outside the walls was a force of citizens, heavily armed, ready to drive back the convicts if they murdered the remaining guards and made a rush through the gates.

Shouts and occasional shots told the story of desperate fighting within the walls. The mutinous prisoners were subdued finally and locked in their cells. Early reports of the killing of several men inside the penitentiary have not been confirmed.

Another battle is in progress in the hills south of Rawlins between a posse of citizens and from 20 to 40 escaped prisoners. Two men have been killed in the streets of Rawlins, one is desperately wounded and two convicts have been recaptured following the escape of from 10 to 20 prisoners.

At 11 o'clock Marshal Hayes returned to Rawlins from the manhunt in the hills, bringing one of the men who escaped, whom he had shot and wounded. The man was placed in the prison hospital. Two of the 20 escapducing the number of original fugi-

The men who escaped were led by Antone Pazo, a life term murderer, who a few months ago in the prison dining room seized a knife and almost disemboweled a fellow prisoner. 
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
