WHAT PRESIDENT TAFT HAS DONE

Some of the Legislation Accomplished During His Administration.

There has been a systematic attempt for years on the part of newspaper and magazine writers in the pay of the great magazine trust to belittle and misrepresent President Taft. The result has been that the people have an impression that this has been a "do nothing" administration. The truth of the matter is that more constructive progressive legislation has been accomplished under President Taft than was ever accomplished in any administration before.

For the benefit of our readers and in justice to the president, this paper sets out below some of the many things he has accomplished:

He put the postoffice department on a paying basis for the first time within the memory of the present generation.

He has enforced the Sherman anti-trust law without fear or favor.

He vetoed the Democratic wool, cotton and free list bills as unfair, unscientific and destructive of the Republican principle of protection.

He abrogated the discriminating passport treaty with Russia.

He prevented railroads from putting rate increases into effect without approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

He has rushed the Panama Canal to early completion without hint of scandal.

He has practically destroyed white slave traffic.

He has signed the bill for admission of Arizona and New Mexico to statehood.

He has established the Bureau of Mines to safeguard the lives of miners.

He has extended our foreign markets for the benefit of American capital and labor.

He has abolished the shameful system of peonage in this country.

He has submitted the income tax amendment to the Constitution to the state legislatures for ratification.

He has effected advanced boiler inspection laws passed by Congress.

He has established means for complete irrigation projects in the West.

He has maintained and extended the open-door policy in China.

He has maintained peace in Cuba and South and Central America by friendly warning, without intervention.

He has modernized and reformed government business methods by an economy and efficiency commission, saving millions of dollars to the American people annually.

He has effected arbitration treaties with Great Britain and France.

He vetoed the Arizona statehood bill because of the recall of judges provision.

He instituted non-political methods for taking the 13th census.

He has effectively destroyed bucket shops and get-rich-quick concerns.

He has persistently labored for a parcels post.

He has effected a new treaty with Japan, ending racial controversies on the Pacific Coast.

He has further extended a safety appliance act for the benefit of workmen.

He has successfully fought for the publication of campaign funds and expenditures.

He has heartily endorsed the labor commission's report and proposed bill concerning employers' liability.

He has reorganized the customs service, eliminated corruption and exposed and punished customs frauds, thereby saving and recovering millions of dollars to the United States Treasury.

He has established the Court of Commerce to review findings of the Interstate Commerce Commission and to remedy exasperating delays in litigation.

He has established a nonpartisan tariff board to report on the difference in the cost of production at home and abroad.

He has secured a corporation tax law yielding over \$20,000,000 annually to the United States government.

He has transformed a deficit of \$5,000,000 of the previous administration into a \$30,000,000 surplus.

He has made a new American record for nonpartisan judicial appointments.

He has brought the railroads under further control of the federal government through extension of the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

He brought the workingman's compensation act to a successful issue in the Supreme Court.

He has effected a successful stock and bonds commission.

He has extended the civil service rules in all departments of the federal government by executive order.

He has secured practical conservation acts.

He has established a Court of Customs Appeals, by which undervaluations have been stopped.

He succeeded in securing a postal savings bank system that is dragging millions out of old socks and putting it to work.

He favored Borah's 3-year home-stand bill.

He has exhibited the highest order of statesmanship in handling the delicate and perplexing Mexican situation keeping the United States out of an expensive and bloody war, while at the same time maintaining the dignity of our nation.

Mothers Will You Help Save the Girls.

The case of a Washington County girl who was arrested on the night of Oct. 3rd, at 11:10 p. m. in an empty side tracked coach in Multnomah County, in company with a conductor on the Forest Grove line or the O. E. R. R., and her story at the police station of having stayed with him on a previous occasion at the hotel in Hillsboro, together with the fact that investigations involve the hotel in Forest Grove, and the added statement of another Washington County girl who told the writer of a motorman on the same line who had made love to her and asked her to marry him that he might give her a beautiful home and make her his queen, and who on investigation, proved to have a wife in Portland, makes one feel how close we ought to stay to our girls.

In taking up some of these matters with the O. E. Company, one of the head men said: "This is a difficult matter to handle, and requires the attention, not only of the company, but of the parents of the girls."

It is against the policy of the social commission to bring anyone into disagreeable publicity, without first giving him a chance to change his conduct.

Both of these men were interviewed and one took timely advice and is still at work, because his name was not given to the company. The other one who let the young girl go to the police station, on a vagrancy charge as he said, "to save trouble," is conspicuous by his absence on his usual run. One of the head men in the company said: "He can never have work with us again."

The R. R. Company are doing all they can to keep men on the line who will be true to their trust. But the game is carefully planned and skillfully played and where parents are careless and hotel keepers are unscrupulous it makes the problem a grave one.

One of the passenger agents said to the writer, when complaint was made: "We are going to make a raid on some of your married women who travel this line that will make sensational reading, if matters are not better soon."

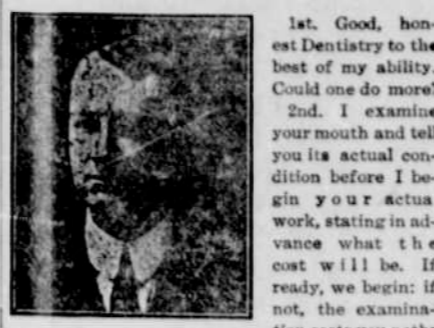
