CIVIL WAR VETERAN IS LAID TO FINAL REST

Father of William F. Hartrampf Dies in Portland and Is Buried at Hillsboro.

HILLSBORO, Ore.—J. W. Hartrampf, a well known veteran of the Civil War, died at the Nesbeth Sanatorium, Portland, and burial took place here Saturday. He had been ill for some time having suffered a stroke of partial paralysis several months ago. He was a member of General Ransom Post, of Hillsboro, and was highly esteemed throughout Washington County. Mr. Hartrampf was born in Prussia May 10, 1846, and came to America when he was but 14 years of age. His family settled in Wisconsin in 1860. He enlisted in Company E. Seventh Wisconsin Infantry and joined the Twenty-second Regiment near Petersburg, Va. early in 1865. He was mustered out of the service at Jeffersonville, Ind., in July of that year. Returning home he was married to Fredericka Wilhelmina Hopp, in Dodge County, Wis., Nov. 18, 1866. They later moved to Minnesota, and in 1886 came to Oregon, settling near Cornelius. The widow and following children survive: Mrs. Elizabeth Thies, Cherry Grove, Ore; William F., Forest Grove; Robert C., Ferninda E., Albert J., Otto B., and the Misses Amanda and Minnie, all of Hillsboro.

Otis Shearer, who slightly scratched his hand last week, had a somewhat narrow escape from blood poisoning as a result. The injured member commenced to swell the first of the week, but prompt action was taken and he is getting along nicely.

ILLUSTRATED LECTURE UPON COMMON BIRDS

State Game Warden Finley Will Talk Under Auspices of The Woman's Club.

That the Woman's Club of Forest Grove is seldom found asleep when questions of betterment and improvement are uppermost is evidenced by the action of the Civics committee of that organization in persuading State Game Warden William L. Finley to deliver his famous lecture upon the life and habits of Oregon birds, absolutely free of all charge. Mr. Finley, who is President of the Oregon Audubon Society, has made an exhaustive and intimate study of bird life, in the course of which he has secured a most rare and valuable collection of lantern slides depicting all varieties of the feathered creatures, and showing their wonderful colorings to the greatest advantage. The lecture will be given in Marsh Hall the evening of November 12, starting promptly at 7:45. Admission will be free and everyone is invited to attend.

COUNTY RETURNS INCOMPLETE GIVE ALL LOCAL OFFICES TO REPUBLICANS EXCEPT THE COMMISSIONER AND SHERIFF

Counting of Ballots A Slow Process. Reports from Outlying Districts Delayed. Woman's Suffrage and High School Fund in Doubt. Wilson, Selling, Hollis, Tongue, Mickle Carry This County.

Although Washington County gave a large majority to the Democratic nominees for President and Vice-President, the election of the entire county Republican ticket, with but two exceptions, that of county commissioner, and sheriff, is conceded. Returns have come in very slowly and up to the time of going to press, no definite figures have been secured.

On the Presidential ticket Wilson ran far ahead of his Republican and Progressive opponents, with Roosevelt second. W. D. Wood, for State Senator has defeated Schulmerich by over 200. The Republican candidates for Representatives have secured a victory by over 300 majority. D. B. Reasoner, Republican candidate for County Judge, defeated R. O. Stevenson, Democrat, by between 600 and 700. For County Commissioner, the Democratic candidate, C. A. Hanley, is conceded to have defeated the Republican nominee, John McClaran, by a good margin. J. E. Reeves, democrat nominee for Sheriff has undoubtedly secured the election by a majority of at least 75 votes over his republican opponent, J. C. Applegate.

MOST COMPLETE ELECTION RETURNS EVER RECEIVED IN WASHINGTON COUNTY FURNISHED BY THE FOREST GROVE PRESS

National, State and County Results Taken Hot From Special Wire by Expert Operator and Read to Large and Enthusiastic Crowd Gathered on Pacific Avenue Until After Midnight.

For the first time in many years the residents in this section of Washington county had an opportunity Tuesday night to receive as full and complete returns of the national, state and county election as any portion of the country. Through the efforts of the FOREST GROVE PRESS arrangements were made early in the day for the exclusive use of a direct Portland wire and the receiving of reports over a practically continuous circuit from all sections of the United States.

It was shortly after five o'clock when the crowd began to gather and inside of an hour over one thousand were standing before the Press office patiently waiting for the opening word which might give some indication as to how the battle was going. Soon the bulletins began to straggle in, mostly from the far east and all showing a happy combination of figures which gave neither of the contending parties advantage one way or the other, but served to keep the listeners upon the keen edge of expectancy.

TO HELP GIRLS SECURE PRIZES AT STATE FAIR

Oregon Agricultural College Will Inaugurate Home Course in Domestic Science.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 2—A department for the young girls of the state, to aid them in winning prizes at the industrial and state fairs and to give them useful information generally, is to be inaugurated in the next issue of the Oregon Countryman, the monthly magazine published by the students of agriculture and home economics at the Oregon Agricultural College.

The first few numbers will be given to the subject of bread making, and ensuing issues will tell what girls of other states are doing, how to make cake, how to can fruit that will win prizes, and how to make jellies that will meet the strictest score card requirements.

From time to time, also discussions of the selection of materials for various garments and other matters regarding sewing will be included. It is one of the objects of the new department to interest young girls in all the operations in their homes. Before many years they will be the home-makers of the state, and they should be interested in their profession.
