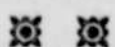

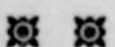

Illustrated Talk by State Game Warden Finley of Intense Interest and Great Value.

Mr. Finley proved a most interesting lecturer and his description of the various birds which inhabit the woods and fields of Oregon was listened to with rapt attention. The colored lantern slides which were used to illustrate the talk were exact and true to nature, and showed the members of the feathered tribe at home and abroad. Many of the photographs were taken under most difficult circumstances, giving views of the young in their nests and the older birds at work and play. Mr. Finley is to be congratulated upon his work in familiarizing the people with their neighbors of the air, and the Civic committee of the Woman's club for their success in persuading him to deliver his lecture in this city.
