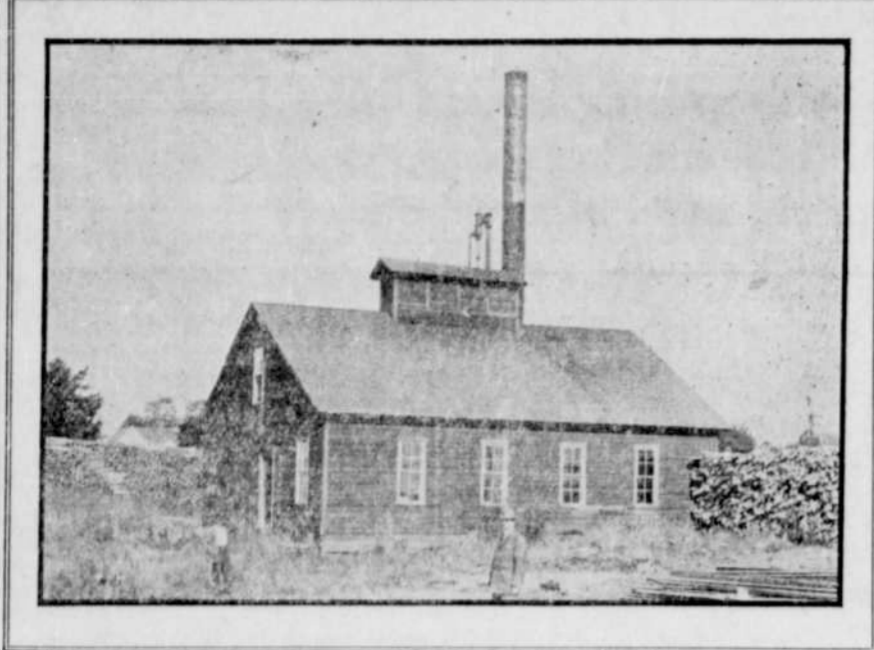


Forest Grove Electric Light Station

REMEMBER, we already carry a considerable part of the service in your city, supplying your business concerns and forty customers who must have light during the hours the city plant is not in operation.

The finance committee of the city made a report last Tuesday showing earnings of \$345 per month for the City Light plant. There is nothing included in this report which shows that any consideration is given to the following important items.

- Insurance.
- Interest on debt.
- Fund for replacing worn out machinery.
- Fund for replacing poles, wire, etc.
- Fund for taking up bonds when due.
- Fund for unexpected damage.
- Rent and minor expenses.

These expenses must be met some day. If they accumulate a bond issue or special assessment must carry the loss. We will analyze the report completely next week.
