Mickel delivered an address upon the care of milk in the dairy and the home which was listened to with great attention. Mrs Austin Buxton spoke upon the conserving of public health and Prof. Proctor, Superintendent of the Forest Grove public schools, explained to the ladies the necessity of more school room and the need of a High school building. Prof. Proctor had plans and specifications at hand to demonstrate the methods by which the present Central building could be renovated and repaired so as to be available for grade purpores for several years to come, at an approximate cost of \$5,000.
