The Progress of City and County

Rapid Strides Made in Past Year by Forest Grove and Adjacent Territory

The year just coming to a close has witnessed many changes for the better in this city and throughout the county. Forest Grove has practically led the way with many improvements of a permanent nature. This city was the first in the county to secure paved streets, and the 27 blocks of Bithulithic pavement which has been laid in the past two years has been an incentive to the business men and others to further improve the city. Numerous well constructed business buildings have been erected and the city beautified with many handsome cluster street lights. In all probability the coming year will witness still further improvement, as a movement is now under way

looking to the paving of a number of additional blocks. Cornelius, Orenco and Beaverton, it is understood, are also contemplating the laying of hard surface pavement upon the principal streets. Hillsboro now has a number of blocks of standard pavement, and will, it is said, add a number of blocks before the end of 1913. Throughout the county improvements of all kinds have been made, and several new towns have sprung up where before were but fields of grain or standing timber. With a continuation of the progressive spirit which has been shown in the past, Washington county will soon be recognized as one of the leading, if not the leading county of the state.

Interesting Talk on Necessity of Additional School Facilities Given by Professor Proctor to Local Club.

Haskell Ferrin favored the meeting with a solo and Miss Margaret Lowell rendered a violin selection which was greatly appreciated. Dairy Commissioner-elect John D. Mickel delivered an address upon the care of milk in the dairy and the home which was listened to with great attention. Mrs. Austin Buxton spoke upon the conserving of public health and Prof. Proctor, Superintendent of the Forest Grove public schools, explained to the ladies the necessity of more school room and the need of a High school building. Prof. Proctor had plans and specifications at hand to demonstrate the methods by which the present Central building could be renovated and repaired so as to be available for grade purposes for several years to come, at an approximate cost of \$5,000.

BOYS ARM BLOWN OFF BY ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGE OF SHOTGUN

Leslie Downs, the 14 year old son of the pastor of the Cornelius Methodist church, while hunting about two miles from this city, Saturday afternoon, had his right arm torn to pieces by the accidental discharge of a shot-gun. The injured lad was taken to a Portland hospital, where amputation of the shattered member between the elbow and wrist, was found necessary. Two companions, White and Hughes, were with young Downs at the time, but neither can give a coherent account of the accident, which was caused by the weapon the lad was carrying dropping out of his hands and striking the ground.

SHOULD SELECT WASHINGTON COUNTY

SALEM, OREG.—Gov. West is in receipt of a letter from Postmaster-General Hitchcock advising him that if he will select a 50-mile stretch of road entirely covered by postal routes, and will give assurance that the sum of \$20,000 will be expended on its improvement, the Postmaster-General's office is authorized to expend \$10,000 on the road. The piece of road may be selected in any part of the state.

SET DATE FOR OPENING OF CANAL

NEW YORK—According to Representative Fitzgerald, chairman of the house appropriations committee, the first ship to pass through the Panama Canal will be sent through the waterway, now approaching completion, on September 25, 1913 the 400th anniversary of the discovery of the Pacific by Balboa.
