Famous American Singer Coming

David Bispham will appear in Song
Recital at Marsh Hall, Monday Night



An event of all-absorbing inter-
est and one of which every
inhabitant of Forest Grove must
be particularly proud is the ap-
pearance of Bispham at Marsh
Hall, Pacific University, on
Monday Dec., 16; one day after
his recital at the Heilig Theatre
in Portland. That Eugene
Kuester, the Portland Manager,
who engaged Mr. Bispham for a
number of concerts in the North-
west, has given Forest Grove
preference to several other cities
anxious to secure this famous
singer, is due to the fact that he
feels, that owing to the nearness
of Portland and the chance to
hear world famous artists, the
people of Forest Grove are able
to appreciate David Bispham's
offering. Today in the world of
music there is no greater and
more dominating figure than
David Bispham, considered the
greatest singer before the public
and the one who has done more
for music in America, and Amer-
ican music, than any other
artist; he has carried his great
message to all parts of America
and his name today is a byword
in every American household.
He is not only a great singer, but
also a great actor; and it has

often been said that the drama
lost a great Star when David
Bispham choose Music as his
profession. This dramatic pow-
er gives him a wonderful hold on
his audience, for when Bispham
sings he puts in his song what
was meant to be there. If it is
tragedy, then there is tragedy
in his voice, if there is devotion,
one feels that he is listening to
a prayer; if it is praise, one is
lifted into the same state with
the singer; if it is love, then ten-
derness and affection are in his
note; if it is humor, you hear the
rippling of laughter; if it is de-
scriptive, you see the thing de-
scribed. There is nothing me-
chanical in Mr. Bispham's sing-
ing—it is all the man himself.
Another feature that makes a
Bispham recital especially inter-
esting is his manysidenedness,
for not only does he sing the
whole program in English, but
he also includes a reading of
music and has become as famous
in that line as in his songs.
Longfellow's wonderfully dra-
matic poem, "King Robert of
Sicily," to which beautiful music
has been written, is the dra-
matic offering that will undoubt-
edly make a lasting appeal to the
audience next Monday.
