Skating parties have become all the "go" and the elite of our little village are enjoying themselves to the music of whirring skates—also some bumps and falls.

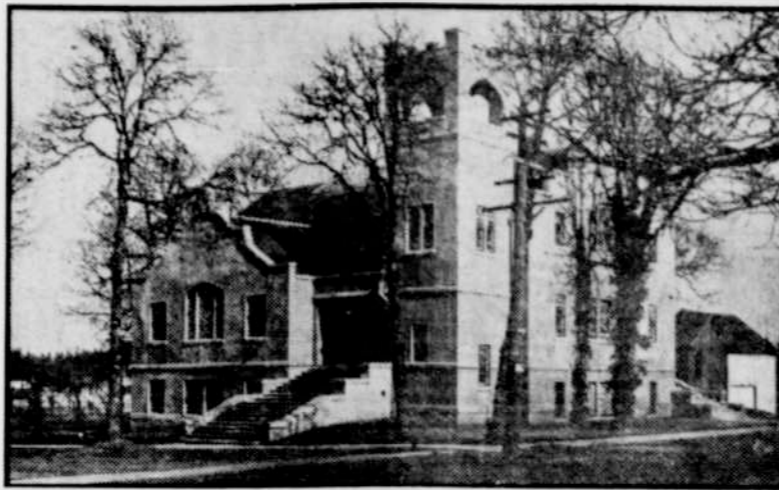

Joseph Taylor Passed Peacefully Wednesday Afternoon

Passing quietly away in the midst of sleep, without pain or suffering, Joseph Taylor, aged 84, joined the vast army of his Maker at 3:30 Wednesday afternoon. Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock from the residence, interment following in the Forest View cemetery. Rev. Hiram Gould will deliver the closing words.

Deceased was born in Northville, N. Y., and went to Chicago in 1844. In Sept. 1853, he was married to Mrs. Kate Morris at Mechanicsburg, Ohio, and the couple resided in Chicago until 1885, when they moved further west to Nebraska, leaving that state in 1892 and locating in Washington, where they remained about one year, coming to Forest Grove in 1893. Besides the widow, who is 82 years of age, one son, R. M. Taylor, of this city, and a sister, Mrs. Jane Grannis, of Chicago, survive.

Mr. Taylor was seldom troubled with sickness of any character, but Wednesday morning remarked to his son that he was feeling poorly, and that he was about "all in." In the afternoon he rested quietly in his arm chair the greater part of the time, finally reclining for the nap from which he will awaken in a better and nobler world.
