### Resolution of Intention to Improve.

WHEREAS there has been presented to the Common Council of the City of Forest Grove and filed with the Recorder of said City a petition signed by property owners abutting on Pacific Avenue between the West line of "A" Street and the West limits of the City of Forest Grove, praying said City Council to grade, construct curb and lay hard surface pavement thirty feet wide upon said Pacific Avenue from the West line of "A" Street to the West limits of the City of Forest Grove, and

WHEREAS said petitioners represent 1284 feet of the feet frontage of said portion of said Pacific Avenue, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Common Council of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon, deems it expedient to grant the prayer of said petition and proposes to improve Pacific Avenue from the West line of "A" Street to the West limits of the City of Forest Grove in the following manner:

First, By grading the street to the proper sub-grade as established by the City Engineer.  
Second, By paving the roadway of said street for a width of thirty feet.  
Third, By constructing hard-surface stone curbs.  
Fourth, By laying and constructing proper headers.  
Fifth, By constructing inlets.  
Sixth, By constructing catch-basins.  
Seventh, By laying vitrified sewer pipe.  
Eighth, By laying wrought iron drain pipes.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinance of the City of Forest Grove, and the plans and specifications and estimates of the City Surveyor to be filed in the office of the City Recorder showing the amount of work to be done in making said improvement and the probable cost thereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost of improving the intersections of said Avenue above described shall be made at the expense of the city of Forest Grove and paid out of the General Fund as provided by the City Charter, the remaining portion of the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against each lot, piece or parcel of real estate abutting on said portion of Pacific Avenue within the limits of the proposed street improvement and each lot, piece or parcel thereof shall be liable for the full cost of making said improvement upon the half of the street in front of and abutting upon said lot, piece or parcel of real estate as provided by the City Charter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Recorder of the City of Forest Grove be and he hereby is ordered and directed to give notice by publication in at least one issue of the Forest Grove Press, a newspaper printed and published in the City of Forest Grove, Washington County, Oregon, directed to the owner or owners of the lot, piece or parcel of real estate abutting on and adjacent to said portion of Pacific Avenue above described, giving notice to said owners of the intention of the City of Forest Grove to establish or alter the grade or grades of said Avenue and parts thereof; to excavate wherever necessary; to construct curbs, sewers, drains; and lay a permanent hard-surface pavement thereon and to make full or partial improvements thereon and to determine and provide everything necessary and convenient for that purpose, and giving an opportunity to protest thereto.

PACIFIC AVENUE FROM THE WEST LINE OF "A" STREET TO THE WEST LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FOREST GROVE, OREGON.

### Woman's Meeting of Interest.

"Library Day" was observed by the Women's Club of Forest Grove with a meeting at the home of Mrs. F. J. Miller.

Miss Spafford spoke on "Librarianship as a profession for women." She gave an outline of the qualifications necessary for the making of a successful librarian and the education and training, including a description of the studies at the library schools and the methods of instruction in use.

There are at present 10 library schools in the country. The New York state library school at Albany, where Miss Spafford received her library training, is the oldest of these, having been established in 1885. There is no library school on the Pacific coast, but one will probably be established within a few years.

The work of the various departments of the modern city library and the choice of the different branches of the work which a trained librarian has were touched upon. Miss Spafford gave an interesting description of the methods used by the traveling libraries division in distributing books in the rural districts by wagons and automobiles, and closed with a mention of the broad field of usefulness filled by the public library in a small town.

Miss Bessie Hope rendered a reading "Billy Brad and the Big Lie," which was well received. Miss Anna Taylor contributed a piano solo, to the great enjoyment of everyone.

The meeting was voted most successful by those present, and the hour of adjournment was met with considerable regret.

### HEALTH HINT FOR TODAY.

#### Care of Teeth.

Good teeth are necessary for the proper mastication of food, without which there cannot be perfect digestion. Impaired digestion soon results in poor health, lowers the vital resistance and therefore makes a person more susceptible to disease.

Cleanliness of the mouth is the factor of greatest importance in the care of the teeth. "Clean teeth do not decay." Food particles allowed to remain in the mouth ferment with the production of the acid, which erodes the enamel of the teeth and results in decay.

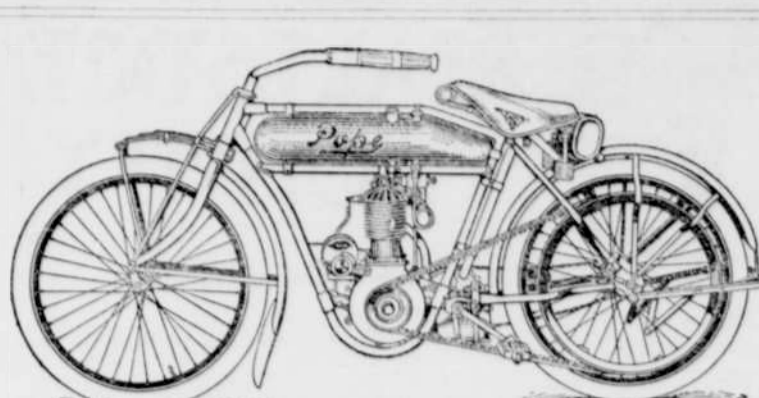

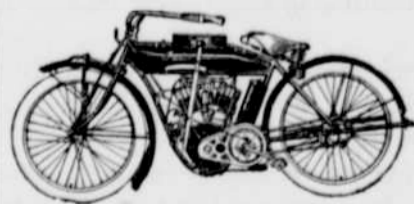
