HEALTH HINT FOR TODAY.

Curing a Bunion.

It is not a hard matter to decide upon the treatment of a bunion. First procure a pair of shoes that do not squeeze the toes together. The inner side of the sole of a shoe should be nearly straight, not slanting toward the middle at the toe. The "mannish" cut of shoes usually has this shape sole, but they can be procured in all weights of leather. The next thing is to relieve the pressure on the sore joint and also try to replace the great toe in its original position. The latter can be aided by placing a piece of cotton between the great toe and the second toe. This tends to throw the big toe back into a straight line with the foot and the joint to resume proper position. To relieve the pressure a small piece of cotton with a hole cut in the center laid directly over the bunion should be worn during the day. If the bunion has not existed a great length of time this treatment will be all that is necessary. However, in some cases the bursa has become infected and pus has formed. Then it may be necessary to remove the bursa. In extreme cases the infection has extended to the joint cavity and the end of the bone has become necrosis (dead). In this case it will be necessary to remove a portion of the bone before the bunion can be relieved.


