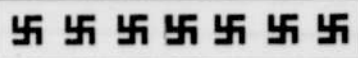

SOME STEAMED PUDDINGS.

A STEAMED pudding is generally wholesome. The steaming may be done by cooking in a steamer and by contact with the steam, or it may be done by cooking the pudding in a double boiler by means of the heat from the steam in the surrounding vessel.

Fruit Puddings.

Lemon Pudding.—Butter a small pudding dish, fill it with slices of thinly cut stale bread and butter sprinkled with sugar and grated lemon peel. Make a custard by mixing half a pint of milk with two well beaten eggs. Pour this over the bread. Let it soak for an hour. Cover with buttered paper and steam for an hour and a quarter. Turn out and serve with fruit or lemon sauce.

Date Pudding.—Take a quarter of a pound of stoned dates, half a pound of suet, half a pound of breadcrumbs, one tablespoonful of sugar, two eggs and one cupful of milk. Chop suet and dates and add other ingredients. Place in a buttered baking dish and steam.

White Pudding.—Take the yolks of three eggs and beat until light. Add gradually one cupful of granulated sugar, stirring all the while. When very light add two tablespoonfuls of milk, one cupful of flour and stir again. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth. Add quickly to the batter one teaspoonful of baking powder. Fill well buttered cups two-thirds full and steam for twenty minutes. Roll in powdered sugar and serve.

Sweet Desserts.

Strup Pudding.—Take two eggs, two ounces of moist sugar, two ounces of butter, one-half pound of flour and a little milk. Beat all together, butter the baking dish well, pour in one-half pound of strup, then fill the dish with the mixture. Steam two and a half hours. When done the strup will form a brown crust.

Caramel Pudding.—Take three eggs and make a custard with two ounces of sugar, half a pint each of milk and cream and six drops of lemon essence. Into a mold put the juice of a lemon and two ounces of sugar. Stand the mold on the stove till the contents turn a golden brown. Then move the mold round that the sides may be covered with the caramel. Stand the mold in cold water till the caramel is set. Pour in the custard and steam slowly for twenty minutes.
