The beautiful shade trees in Forest Grove are now in full leaf, and strangers to our city are unstinted in their praise of the added beauty which the trees give our town. Every effort should be made to persuade property owners not to cut down the maples in front of their property except when it is absolutely necessary. One week from next Tuesday a law making it compulsory for men contemplating getting married in Oregon to undergo a medical examination will go into effect, and county clerks will refuse them marriage licenses unless the certificate of a licensed physician, taken under oath, accompanies the application. Following are the provision of the law which is one of the best ever passed by the Oregon legislature: "Before any county clerk in this state shall issue a marriage license, the applicant therefor shall file with the clerk from whom such license is sought, a certificate from a physician duly authorized to practice medicine within the state, made under oath, within ten days from the date of filing the same, showing that the male person thus seeking to enter the marriage relation is free from contagious or infectious venereal disease. Any physician who shall, knowingly and wilfully, make a false statement in any certificate issued, as herein provided, shall be punished by the revocation of his license to practice his profession within the state.

All fees and charges of any physician making the necessary examination of and issuing the necessary certificate to any one party, as herein provided, shall not exceed the sum of \$2.50. The county physicians of the several counties shall, upon request, make the necessary examination and issue certificate, if the same can properly be issued, without charge to the applicant, if indigent."
