Congressman Declares They Deplete Population of Towns.

The great American mail order houses are fast putting the country merchant out of business, asserts Representative Hinebaugh, the Illinois Progressive, who recently inserted in the Congressional Record in the house an argument in support of his bill taxing these concerns for rural beuefits. His measure proposes that the reveaue thus raised shall be expended in building country roads.
