NATIONAL GRANGE

Program Outlined For Annual Meeting at Manchester, N. H.

Every One Looking Forward to the Greatest Session as to Numbers and General Interest That Has Been Held in Recent Years.

The local committee in charge of arrangements and program for the next national grange meeting, to be held at Manchester, N. H., in November, has made a preliminary announcement. The following is the tentative program:

Tuesday, Nov. 11.—Evening session only at which official welcome will be extended by the governor of New Hampshire, mayor of the city, congressman and a past master of the state grange.

Wednesday, Nov. 12.—Business sessions morning and afternoon and a public meeting in the evening, which will be addressed by Secretary of Agriculture Houston of Washington, the national master and others.

Thursday, Nov. 13.—Business session in the morning, conferring of the fifth and sixth degrees for out of state Patrons in the afternoon and the seventh degree in the evening.

Friday, Nov. 14.—Business session in the morning, conferring the fifth and sixth degrees on New Hampshire Patrons in the afternoon and the seventh degree in the evening.

Saturday, Nov. 15.—Business session in the morning and afternoon and a trip to Concord as guests of the state and city of Concord. Round table session in the evening.

Sunday, Nov. 16.—Special services in the churches in the morning and the annual memorial service in the afternoon.

Monday, Nov. 17.—Business session in the morning and evening and in the afternoon visit to the manufacturing industries of the city.

Tuesday, Nov. 18.—Business sessions morning and afternoon and in the evening the grange will be the guests of the chamber of commerce at dinner and the theater.

Wednesday, Nov. 19.—Business sessions in the morning and afternoon and the annual meeting of the Priests of Demeter in the evening.

Thursday, Nov. 20.—Business sessions in the morning and evening, and in the afternoon there will be a trip to Whipple farm, New Boston.

Friday, Nov. 21.—Business sessions and final work of the grange.

Saturday, Nov. 22.—All day trip through New Hampshire as guests of the state grange. At Laconia as guests of the board of trade, at Durham as guests of the college, at Portsmouth and navy yard as guests of granges and board of trade.

The chamber of commerce of Manchester has entered into a contract with the national grange to guarantee hotel rates so that there shall be no extortion. The Manchester hotel will be headquarters. The committee announces that all who attend will have good accommodations. Manchester can take care of 5,000.

Grange Life Insurance.
 Somehow or other the grange has never made much of a success of life insurance. As to grange fire insurance, there is much to be said in its favor and of its noteworthy success. The national grange has had the subject before it for several years, but it has formulated nothing. The Michigan state grange is now experimenting with the problem of working out a satisfactory scheme of grange life insurance, but it has not passed the experimental stage. New Hampshire has a small association which has been in business a good many years, but no effort has been made to largely increase membership, and yet it has been rendering good service to those enrolled upon its books. It is purely mutual. There may be other such life associations, but they are few. It may be that the subject will come up again at the next meeting of the national grange, but we imagine it will go the way of all past efforts along this line. The right plan has not yet appeared, and when it does it may be worked out with as great success as the fire insurance, but of this we have serious doubts.

Naming the Order.
 Among the many names or titles suggested for the Order of Patrons of Husbandry when it was being instituted, these were most to the point: "The Independent Order of Progressive Farmers," "Knights of the Plow," "Lords of the Soil," and in place of calling it a "lodges" to name it a "grange," "arbor" or simply "home." In 1847 Mr. Kelley wrote, "How would it do to call the lodges 'granges'?" He says that he took the name "grange" from an order advertised at that time. In reply came the query as to how "Patrons of Husbandry" would do. This name was endorsed at a meeting held in the office of William Saunders in Washington on Nov. 15, 1847. It was also decided at this meeting that the branches of the order should be known as granges instead of lodges. William M. Ireland presided at this meeting, and O. H. Kelley acted as secretary.

Unique Field Day.
 A rather unusual way to celebrate a grangers' field day was that employed at Westwood, Mass. After an illustrated lecture on clearing rock covered fields by dynamite a demonstration was given in a pasture field. The dynamite was applied to a great rock, which was torn from its moorings and thrown high in the air. One section, weighing about thirty pounds, crashed through the roof of an adjoining cottage, but no one was in the house at the time.
