If you have no decided opinior is to the breed you prefer, study he different breeds carefully and nd try to decide which are best idapted to your conditions, get he views of different breeders n the subject, make a note of hat you learn and sift it out at our leisure.

Cultivate a friendly feeling oward all you come in contact vith and you will increase your njoyment, as well as that of others. These annual meets should be made a renewal of old equaintances, and the forming of new ones that will be of lastng benefit.
