SUBSTITUTES FOR MEAT.

THERE are many foods whose nutritive value is equal to that of meat. They are convenient substitutes for meats when the latter are, as at present, excessively high. Recipes for some excellent foods of this kind are given here:

A Nourishing Cereal.

Spinach and Rice.—Cook a quarter of a pound of rice in milk and at the same time cook the spinach. When the vegetable is cooked strain, season and mince. Add a beaten egg to the rice, with a spoonful of thick sour cream, butter, salt and pepper. Rice and spinach are then placed alternately in a buttered pie dish, a little of the spinach water is poured in, and the top is covered with melted butter and breadcrumbs, and the dish is set in the oven for 10 to 15 minutes.

Cooked in the Oven.

Baked Rabbit.—Take a pound of American cheese, two tablespoonfuls of butter, a teaspoonful and a half of salt, one and a half cupfuls of milk, two and a half cupfuls of stale bread-crumbs, three eggs and paprika. Line a buttered baking dish with bread-crumbs. Cut the cheese in thin slices and lay over the crumbs, dusting with salt and paprika. Repeat twice. Beat the eggs well, add milk and pour over the mixture. Bake in moderate oven half an hour. Serve at once.

A Novel Roast.

Roast Peas.—Take a quart of split yellow peas, three-quarters of a cupful of bread-crumbs, a tablespoonful of sugar, a quarter of a cupful of chopped nuts, one egg, a quarter of a cupful of butter, three-quarters of a cupful of milk and salt and pepper to taste. Soak the peas overnight. Drain. Place in a saucepan, using fresh water to cover, and simmer until nearly all the liquor is absorbed and the peas have burst their skins. Force through a strainer and mix with bread-crumbs, milk, nuts and seasonings. Mold into a small loaf and let stand fifteen minutes. Cover with pea liquor and bake slowly one hour. Remove to a platter and serve with sliced cucumbers.

A Nut Food.

Peanut Loaf.—Take one cupful each of hot boiled rice, finely chopped peanuts, cracker crumbs and milk, one egg, a tablespoonful of melted butter and one and a half teaspoonfuls of salt. Mix rice, nuts and cracker crumbs. Add a well beaten egg and seasonings. Fill into a small oblong pan well greased and pour melted butter over it. Bake slowly. Turn on a platter and serve with white sauce to which have been added one tablespoonful of onion juice and a dash of white pepper.

Making Bread That is Good and Wholesome

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon—"Bread should be in flavor sweet and nutty and the odor should be the same as the flavor. It should be so completely baked that, when pressed, it immediately springs out upon release of pressure. The color should be golden brown, top, sides and bottom. The loaf should be evenly raised, with no cracked, protruding or uneven crusts. The bread when cut should have a soft, velvety texture, all harshness absent. It should slice smoothly without crumbling. The holes should be numerous, small and of uniform size. The color should be a slightly creamy white," says Mrs. Henrietta W. Calvin, dean of the School of Domestic Science and Art, Oregon Agricultural College.

While everyone knows good bread from bad, it is not every one that knows how to apply the principles required to secure the many details that constitute good bread. The details are simply and entertainingly given by Mrs. Calvin in College Bulletin No. 83, Extension Series 3, just issued by the Extension Division.
