A Clean County Dominant Note

The system of high licence was explained and refuted as not only useless but detrimental.

Among those who took part was Mrs. J. M. Barber the state juvenile officer. In a few terse sentences she pictured the crying need of law and of law enforcement. It was said that Forest Grove is referred to as 'The Holy City'. In discussing this question Miss Taylor gave several pointed quotations 'The church could do what it would if it would do what it could'. Thirty per cent of the citizens do not vote and the major part of this thirty percent will be found in brown stone fronts under the church spires and even the pastors some times shrink the responsibility. 'These are problems of the Christian.' 'The Christian has no place out of politics and the man who is not a Christian has no place in politics.' There is no doubt that if the temperance question was left to the Endeavors their battle cry of 'On to Washington' would soon become a reality.
