FOUR DEPOTS ROBBED

Valuables Taken From Trunks at Wilkesboro, Ore.

BANKS, Or.,—(Special)—Early Friday morning burglars made a raid on four railroad depots in this vicinity, including the Pacific Railway & Navigation depot at Banks. So far as can be ascertained the only harvest of any consequence reaped was at the Wilkesboro United Railway depot, where several trunks of two families who are settling here were smashed open and all valuables or portable contents extracted.

One trunk, the property of Mrs. Clarke, of Turner, Or., who was on her way to locate in business here, was rifled. A highly valuable pair of ear-rings, two gold rings, two gold watches, silverware, etc. were taken. A claim agent was sent here to ad-

just the losses and it is said they will amount to about \$2000. This is the second time the Wilkesboro agent has been robbed within a month.

CHINA SENDS APOLOGY

Insult to Flag and Murder at Nanking Condoned.

Pekin.—The apology of General Chang Hsun to the Japanese consulate at Nanking has cleared the air, according to the Japanese officials here, and removes the danger of complications for the present.

The Japanese legation emphatically denied that an ultimatum had been sent by the Japanese government to China. The legation stated that the Chinese authorities at Hankow and Shantung had complied fully with the Japanese demands.

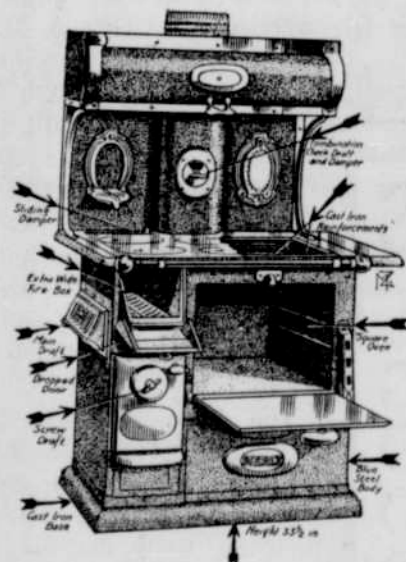
