CLEAN-UP DAY NEXT TUESDAY

City Council Takes Care of Many Routine Matters

In regular monthly assembly, the city fathers last Tuesday evening attended to many routine matters until a late hour. In response to a request from the Woman's club next Tuesday was declared Clean-up Day. All rubbish should be sacked and placed on the street early Tuesday morning.

The finance committee's report was accepted. Instructions were given to issue warrants in favor of the Linden-Kibbe Construction company for \$4,696 for paving of street intersections. Also a warrant of \$195 upon the completion and acceptance of the remodeling the old watertower into a tool house. The treasurer's report was accepted.

Judge Hollis advised the city not to consider the request of Capt. Peters for damages due to injuries received from a claimed faulty sidewalk, for the reason that in his opinion it was not the jurisdiction of the council to determine such matters.

Several matters concerning grades and sidewalks were referred to the street committee. Mr. Hall requested permission to operate a popcorn wagon on the streets. The matter was referred to the ordinance committee and attorneys.

Ed Haines requested the elimination of a telephone pole in front of the new bank building and the matter of arranging same was left with the Light commissioner.

A vote of thanks was given Mr. Broderson for painting the lamp posts on the streets. The Washington-Oregon Corporation was represented and requested that something definite be settled in regard to their offer to furnish electric service to the city.

Gradings were established on the following streets and the engineer instructed to prepare grades on A Street and others. On Main street from the south line of Third Avenue to the north line of Fourth Avenue, and continuing on Fourth Avenue from the east line of Main Street to the east line of A Street. On First Avenue North from the west line of A Street to the east line of B Street. On C Street from the north line of Pacific Avenue to the south line of First Avenue North. On B Street from the north line of Pacific Avenue to the south line of Third Avenue North.

COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL BANQUET

All Invited to Big Booster Meeting on Oct. 31

The president at the request of C. C. Chapman of the Oregon Development League of Portland, reported having secured samples of nuts and apples grown here to be sent to the Chicago Land show, Nov. 20th, for exhibition purposes.

A communication from the Salem Commercial Club was read requesting us to send a delegate to a convention to be held at Albany, Oct. 30th, at 2:30 p. m. Objects: the advancement of the whole Willamette Valley, and an Oregon exhibit at the Panama Pacific Exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915. Hon. E. W. Haines was appointed delegate and will leave here Oct. 30th to be in attendance.

The matter of arranging for a banquet to be given by the Commercial Club was discussed and decided upon and the following committees were appointed: On arrangement, Messrs. With further reference to the banquet, it might be well to explain one of its purposes, namely, to
