DEDICATE CONGRESS HALL

President Wilson Occupies the Historic Chair Used by John Hancock. GIRL HAS GOOD ROAD PLAN

Eugene.—Road-building, a course of study for the rural schools of western Lane county, is to be introduced within a few days by Miss Goldie Van Biber, school supervisor in the Siuslaw district. Instructions have been mailed. This is the first experiment of its kind ever tried in Oregon. Actual road-building is the laboratory work which will accompany this course. The children of each district will build and maintain during the approaching rainy season a strip of county road near the school building. The school whose road stands the winter and is found in the best condition will be the winner of a unique contest in which school children on the Siuslaw eagerly are awaiting to participate.

County Judge Helms W. Thompson, Lane county's most active good roads enthusiast, was so pleased with this woman's plan to teach the fundamentals of road building in the rural schools that he immediately offered two huge silver cups as prizes for this good roads contest.

One Dead, One Hurt in Wreck.

ORDINANCE NO. 244

An Ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of improvement bonds for the improvement of Pacific Avenue, from the west side of the pavement on A Street to its intersection with the western limits of the City of Forest Grove, Washington County, Oregon, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 3245 to 3253, inclusive, of Chapter 5, Title XXVI, Lord's Oregon Laws, Volume 2, and declaring an emergency.

Whereas, the common council of the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, proceeded to improve Pacific Avenue from the west side of the pavement on A Street to its intersection with the western limits of the city of Forest Grove, Washington County, Oregon, by Ordinance No. 235, approved on the Third day of June, 1913, in accordance with the plans and specifications duly and regularly adopted for the improvement of Pacific Avenue from the west side of the pavement on A Street to its intersection with the western limits of the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, and did by Ordinance No. 237, approved the 23rd day of June, 1913, and by resolution adopted September 30, 1913, and approved the 30th day of September, 1913, levy an assessment against and upon the several lots or parts thereof, pieces and parcels of land affected by said improvement of said street, and in all respects complied with the provisions of the charter; and

Whereas, within ten days after notice of such assessment was first published, there were filed with the Recorder of the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, written applications to pay said assessments levied against the property on the street aforesaid in installments; and Whereas, the said applicants and property owners did thereby waive all irregularities or defects, jurisdictional or otherwise, in the proceedings to improve said Pacific Avenue from the west side of the pavement on A Street to its intersection with the western limits of the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, for which said assessments were levied and in the apportionment of the cost thereof; and

Whereas, said applicants and property owners agreed to pay said assessments in ten annual installments, with interest at the same rate on all said assessments which have not been paid as that expressed in the bond issue to pay for such improvement; and

Whereas, said applications contain a statement by meters and bounds of said pieces, parcels or tracts of lands or other convenient descriptions of the property of the applicant assessed for such improvement, and said applicants have in all respects complied with the requirements of Chapter Five, Title XXVI, Lord's Oregon Laws, and the applications contain a statement of the amount of the unpaid assessment against said property and were duly signed by the applicants and were properly witnessed; and

Whereas, the applications are now on file in the office of the Recorder of the city of Forest Grove, and the same have been duly entered in the Bond Lien Docket; and

Whereas, the total amount of the unpaid assessment for such street improvement for which applications to pay under the provisions of the act above referred to have been filed as shown by the Bond Lien Docket is the sum of \$837.44. Now Therefore, The City of Forest Grove Does Ordain as Follows: Section 1. That the city of Forest Grove issue its bonds in all equal to the amount of \$837.44, being the total amount of the unpaid assessments for such street improvement and for which application to pay under the provisions of Chapter Five, Title XXVI, Lord's Oregon Laws, has been filed as shown by the Bond Lien Docket of said city, which said bonds shall be numbered from one to eleven both inclusive, and shall be in denominations of \$500.00 each, except Bond No. One which shall be for the sum of \$37.44.

Section 2. That said bonds shall be dated the 1st day of November, 1913, and shall be the terms thereof mature in ten years from the date thereof, and shall be payable in gold coin of the United States and bear interest at the

rate of six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually; said interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to said bonds which must have a number printed or inscribed thereon corresponding to that of the bond, both principle and interest to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer of Forest Grove, Oregon.

Section 3. That the right to take up and cancel such bond or bonds, upon the payment of the face value thereof, with accrued interest to the date of payment, at any semi-annual coupon period at or after one year from the date of such bond or bonds, is hereby reserved, said redemption of bonds if so made to be in accordance with the provisions of the law herein cited.

Section 4. That such bonds before the issuance thereof shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon, and authenticated by the seal of said city, the coupons however, may have printed thereon a facsimile signature of the Mayor and Recorder, and shall be registered consecutively by number and denomination of each in a book to be kept by the Recorder to be known and designated as the "Improvement Bond Register."

Section 5. That each of said bonds shall have distinctly and plainly inscribed or printed on the face thereof the registered number, and the words, "Improvement Bond," with the name of the city.

Section 6. That said bonds shall be advertised for sale for a period of ten days from the date of first publication and sold for the highest price obtainable, but for not less than par and accrued interest; and that the proceeds thereof shall be paid by the purchaser to the Treasurer of the City of Forest Grove, and the par value thereof credited to the respective street improvement funds for which said bonds are issued and the accrued interest and premium, if any, accruing from the sale of said bonds shall be credited to the general fund of the city.

Section 7. That said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

United States of America, State of Oregon, City of Forest Grove, 1913 Improvement Bond.

Know All Men by These Presents: That the City of Forest Grove, County of Washington, State of Oregon, for value received, hereby agrees and promises to pay the bearer the sum of Five Hundred Dollars in Gold Coin of the United States of America, on the presentation and surrender of this obligation on the first day of November in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Three, without grace, with interest thereon from the date thereof until redeemable at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually in like coin on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year on presentation and surrender of the proper coupons hereto annexed, principal and interest payable at the office of the Treasurer of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon.

This bond is one of a series authorized by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, entitled "An Act to provide for the issuance of bonds for the improvement of streets and the laying of sewers in incorporated cities, and for the payment of the cost of such improvements and laying of sewers by installments," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 22, 1893, as amended by an Act entitled "An Act to amend Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of an Act entitled 'An Act to provide for the issuance of bonds for the improvement of streets and the laying of sewers in incorporated cities, and for the payment of the cost of such improvements, and laying of sewers, by installments,' filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 22, 1893," approved February 28, 1907, and subsequently amended thereto passed by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, and is an obligation of the city of Forest Grove aforesaid, and is not to be deemed or taken to be within or a part of the limitation by law as to the

indebtedness of said city of Forest Grove; and it is further certified that all requirements of law have been fully complied with by the proper officers in the issuing of this bond, and that the total amount of this issue does not exceed the limit prescribed by said Act. This bond is redeemable at the office of said Treasurer at the option of the city of Forest Grove upon the payment of the face value thereof with accrued interest to the date of payment at any semi-annual coupon period at or after one year from date hereof, as provided in said Act.

For fulfillment of the conditions of this obligation the faith and credit of the city of Forest Grove are hereby pledged.

In Witness Whereof, this bond has been signed by the Mayor and attested by the Recorder of said city of Forest Grove, and the corporate seal of the city of Forest Grove hereto affixed, this 1st day of November, 1913.

Section 8. That the Mayor and Recorder are hereby authorized and required to make, execute and deliver, in behalf of the city of Forest Grove, Oregon, improvement bonds as hereinbefore provided, to the amount of \$5,837.44.

Section 9. That inasmuch as the street aforesaid by reason of never having before been properly repaired and constructed, is in bad condition, and in consequence thereof it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the city that the said street or part of street be improved with all convenient speed, and to that end it is necessary that the city provide funds to pay the cost of such improvement, an emergency is therefore hereby declared and this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage by three-fourths vote of all the members of the City Council, taken by ayes and nays and its approval by the Mayor.

Section 10. The City Recorder is hereby directed to cause a notice to be published for one issue of THE FOREST PRESS, giving notice of the intention of said city to issue bonds as heretofore provided, and calling for sealed bids for said bonds, to be filed with the City Recorder on or before November 11, 1913, at eight o'clock P. M.
